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1 Corinthians 8: 1-13

One of the issues the church in Corinth asked Paul to address was if Christians could eat meat that had been sacrificed to idols. Is this a sin? The meat that was sold in the market was often leftover from meat that had been sacrificed to the images of Greek deities. Also, members of the church might have to attend pagan rites and banquets due to their position in the city. For example, as a city council member you would be expected to attend a city council meeting held at the temple of Athena. Then could you eat the meat that had been sacrificed to the image of Athena?

Paul answers that there is only one God. Idols are only man-made images of gods that really do not exist. Therefore, the meat is not really being sacrificed to a real deity. It seems Paul is saying that it is permissible to eat meat sacrificed to idols.

Ok, in Corinth two thousand years ago it was determined that eating meat sacrificed to idols was not a sin. So what? I don't think that is an issue for us today. I don't think the kid flipping hamburgers at Burger King is sacrificing those hamburgers to some pagan god. How is this relevant to us 2000 years later in West Columbia, SC?

Where this passage becomes relevant for us today is that Paul addresses an issue that goes beyond simply eating meat sacrificed to idols. Paul recognizes that each person has a different moral consciousness; one's warning buzzer about the propriety of one's considered actions. This moral consciousness differs according to where an individual is in their faith and understanding. Also, Paul considered sin to be more relational rather than behavioral. Sin is what leads to broken relationships between an individual and God plus between an individual and others. Sins are what leads to broken relationships, not necessarily specific acts.

Paul is saying to those people with a strong moral consciousness who understand and possess the knowledge that idols are not real gods, that eating meat does not really matter. However, there are those in the congregation that have a weak moral consciousness. They may not fully understand that eating meat sacrificed to an idol is not worshipping the god that idol represents. They may be recent converts who not long before were making sacrifices to that idol. These brothers and sisters may see one eating meat sacrificed to an idol and question if it is permissible to worship other gods. Thus, your liberty to eat meat may become a stumbling block which causes someone else to question the faith. Your liberty may cause someone else to sin, to break their relationship with God.

But notice how Paul makes this point. He sets himself up as an example. Even though he knows that it is permissible to eat meat that has been sacrificed to idols, if there is a brother or sister that might be led astray from God by his action, he won't eat meat. He won't let his action, even though it may be permissible, become a stumbling block to a brother or sister. Paul is challenging those people with a strong moral consciousness to be an example to those who are weak in their relationship with God.

We all have our individual moral consciousness. We may differ in our opinions of what constitutes sin according to our experience and understanding of our relationship with God. We may believe from our experience and understanding of God that certain actions are permissible. However, there may be others whose experience and understanding of God may not be as strong. Our actions could become a stumbling block to their relationship with God.

Therefore, we are an example to others. I remember Charles Barkley saying that he did not want to be a role model. But like it or not Charles Barkley was a role model for many kids. Like it or not we are the role models for others as we re-present Christ to those around us. People look at us and decide about their relationship with Jesus by our actions.

Nothing is more devastating than seeing someone who you admired and respected as a Christian do or condone something very un-Christlike. I had always admired and respected Joe Paterno as a football coach, a man, and a Christian. When the whole Jerry Sandusky situation broke, and the evidence showed that Paterno tried to cover it up, I was shocked and to a degree heartbroken. Ashton immediately dropped Penn State from her list of law schools. Now that did not impact me in regards to my faith for it was well established, but consider the impact that might have had on someone who was seeking God that looked to Joe Paterno as an example. Would they want to follow a god that condones child molestation?

We have liberty for our moral consciousness to be set according to our experience, understanding, and relationship with God. But when we let our liberty become a stumbling block to others in their relationship with God, we sin against Christ for we do not show love and consideration for our brother or sister.

We show love and build others up when we do not exercise our liberty when our actions may become a stumbling block to others. When we say, "I believe this is OK but I won't do it because you do not believe it is OK." We show love and consideration for the other. Our respecting where they are in their experience and understanding of God may lead them to a better experience and understanding of God.

We may use the liberty of our experience, understanding, and relationship with God without restraint, and become a stumbling block to others. Or we may restrain our liberty, showing love and consideration for those whose moral consciousness may differ from ours and be an example of Christ for them.
