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Who Is Worthy? 8/1/2021

2 Samuel 11: 1-15, 26-12: 13a Psalm 51

Read 11: 1-15

If anyone was worthy to receive Holy Communion, it was David. David was the one chosen by God. He was anointed to be king over Israel as a young boy. God brought him out of the shepherd's pasture and made him king over Israel, over Gods chosen people. You could say he was the chosen of the chosen. He defeated Goliath. He remained faithful to God. He walked with God. God had made a covenant with David that his house would stand forever. Yes, if anyone was worthy to receive communion, it was David. David appeared untainted by sin.

Until one spring, when David decides not to go to war with the Ammonites. He sends Joab to fight for him. David goes up on the roof of his house. At this point in time, David's house is the highest point in Jerusalem. Standing on the roof, David can look down into the courtyards of the houses below. As David looks over the city, he spies a woman bathing. He thinks, "I want her, I'm the king" so he sends messengers to get her.

From that one covetous thought David begins to spiral down. He goes from coveting to stealing. He goes from stealing to raping. He goes from raping to lying and manipulation to cover up. Finally, when his manipulations fail, he resorts to murder. He abuses the power and position God had given him. David, the one chosen by God to be king over God's chosen people, sins in multiple ways. He goes from being most worthy to being most unworthy.

David's sin was not just all the acts he did. The sin comes in because those thoughts and acts broke his relationship with God. David turned his back on God. Instead of continuing to follow God's ways, David abused the power and position God had given him. Sin is the broken relationship with God. David broke the bond he had with the God who loved him.

We all have sinned. Maybe not to the degree of David, but we all have in some way broken relationships with other people and with God. We may have had thoughts like David had. Thoughts that may seem insignificant but may lead to harmful words or actions. David's downward spiral began with a thought, which led to actions, all which broke relationships.

So, who is worthy to come to this table today? Who is worthy to come and eat the bread and drink the wine that represents the body and blood of the Son of God? I am not. I fear none of us are. Do we leave the table empty?

No, wait, let's hear the rest of the story.

Read 11:26-12: 13a

The prophet, Nathan, confronts David. He appeals to David's sense of justice as he tells the story of the poor man's lamb. David is righteously indignant and his sense of justice tells him the man deserves to die. Nathan says to David, "You are the man, you are the one that deserves to die."

As sinners we deserve to die. We deserve to be cut off from God as David deserved to die, to be cut off from God.

David could have ordered Nathan to be executed for his impertinence of accusing the king. But David recognizes that he has sinned. He confesses that he has sinned against God, as we read in Psalm 51:4, "Against you, you alone have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight, so you are justified in your sentence and blameless when you pass judgement." David recognizes his sin. He pleads for God to have mercy, to blot out his iniquities, to create in him a clean heart and to put a new and right spirit within him. David pleads for God not to hold his sin against him and to realign his spirit with God's spirit.

David offered to God the sacrifice God truly wanted: a broken spirit, a broken and contrite heart. His spirit was broken, and David offered a contrite heart that would turn back toward God. David repented. God took that broken and contrite heart and realigned it to God's. This is God's grace.

Though David was not sinless, David could come to the table.

We are not sinless but we can come to the table. We can come from the grace of God. We come to the table, not because we are worthy, but we offer to God a broken and contrite heart.

This Holy meal is a means of grace. It is a way in which we experience God's grace that reveals our sin. It is a way in which we experience God's grace that, as we repent and turn back to God, justifies and realigns our spirit to God's. It is a means by which we experience God's grace that leads us to perfection, to know the love for God and for neighbor. We come not because we deserve God's Grace but because we need God's grace!

We hear this in the words of Charles Wesley's great Eucharistic poem, Come, Sinner to the Gospel Feast:

Come, sinners, to the Gospel feast; Let every soul be Jesu's guest. Ye need not one be left behind, For God hath bid all humankind.

Jesus calls all to come to the table.

Come, all ye souls by sin oppressed,
Ye restless wanderers after rest,
Ye poor, and maimed, and sick, and blind;
In Christ a hearty welcome find.

Those oppressed by sins they committed and sins committed against them.

Ye vagrant souls, on you I call! (O that my voice could reach you all!)

You all may now be justified, You all may live, for Christ hath died.

We who wander may live because Christ has died.

This is the time; no more delay!
This is the Lord's accepted day.
Come in this moment at His call,
And live for Him Who died for all.

The invitation is now, so why wait!

Sinners my gracious Lord receives— Harlots, and publicans, and thieves, Drunkards, and all ye hellish crew, I have a message now to you:

"The worst unto My supper press, Monsters of daring wickedness; Tell them My grace for all is free; They cannot be too bad for Me."

It doesn't matter how "bad" we are. It doesn't matter how far we have strayed from God. It doesn't matter how unworthy we are. It doesn't matter if our sin is "great" or "small". What matters is that God calls us to come, to know God's grace and be broken and contrite so God may realign our Spirits, making our will God's will and our spirit God's Spirit.
