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Wait a Minute! 11/14/2021

Ruth 3:1-5; 4: 13-17

We pick up the story of Ruth and Naomi. Naomi has returned to Bethelem after spending ten years in Moab. With her is her Moabite daughter-in-law, Ruth. Naomi has told the women of Bethlehem not to call her Naomi, which means pleasant, but Mara, which means bitter. She has no male heir. Her husband's name will be lost. She has no status. All she has is a Moabite daughter-in-law. Naomi has lost everything and needs redemption and restoration.

We all need redemption and restoration. We have all at times been bitter. We may have bitterness in our lives today. We may, like Naomi, feel that the LORD has dealt harshly with us. Our lives have changed from pleasant to bitter. We need redemption and restoration.

The story of Ruth is the story of Naomi's redemption and metaphorically the redemption and restoration of Israel. Scholars believe that it was written in its present form during the post-exilic era, the time of Ezra and Nehemiah. In this story, there are points in which the audience might well say, wait a minute!

While Naomi remains wrapped in her bitterness, Ruth goes to glean the fields as the barley harvest has begun. In Levitical law, any stalks of grain not gathered in sheaves were left for the poor and sojourner. Also, the edges of the fields were not to be cut for the same reason.

It just happens that Ruth begins gleaning in the field of Boaz. Boaz was introduced at the beginning of Chapter two as a kinsman of Naomi's husband Elimelech and a very prominent citizen of Bethlehem. Boaz notices Ruth gleaning in his field and asks about her. He is told that Ruth is the Moabite daughter-in-law of Naomi.

Now we come to the first "wait a minute" point in the story. Boaz tells his servants to give preferential treatment to Ruth. Boaz sees and recognizes Ruth's plight. Ruth asks Boaz why she, a foreigner, found favor with him. At this point, the audience might have said, "wait a minute, why did Boaz notice this Moabite woman?"

Boaz replies that he has heard all Ruth has done for Naomi. Then to further the minute, Boaz invites Ruth to eat with him and his servants. He instructs his servants to leave extra gleanings for her. He instructs Ruth to stay near his servants as a way of offering her protection. Boaz not only notices this Moabite woman, but he also gives her great favor.

Upon hearing of Ruth's encounter with Boaz, Naomi realizes she may now have a way of obtaining security and a future for Ruth and herself. At the end of the harvest, there is a celebration on the threshing floor. Naomi encourages Ruth to take advantage of the situation, which Ruth does. After that night, Boaz promises he will act as kinsman/redeemer for Naomi.

Boaz buys the parcel of land that belonged to Elimelech that Naomi is selling, keeping the land in the family. By doing this, Boaz is able to take Ruth as a legitimate wife. They have a son named Obed, meaning "He who serves." Thus, Naomi is redeemed and restored. She goes from being pleasant to bitter and now back to pleasant.

Wait a minute! Let's consider how Naomi's redemption and restoration took place. The primary means was through a Moabite woman and a disobedient one at that. This Moabite woman gained the attention and affection of a prominent man of Bethlehem. This eminent man went to all the trouble of replacing the first

redeemer/kinsman to buy Elimelech's field so he could legitimately marry this Moabite woman. A foreigner was the way by which Naomi was redeemed and restored.

We never know the means by which we may find our redemption. Perhaps it may be a foreigner, someone different from us. Our friend John is a conservative white male. He met Michael Ernest, a young black man diagnosed with schizophrenia, and began bringing him to Sunday school. John was going through a difficult divorce at this time. He developed an unlikely friendship with Michael Ernest and discovered that Michael Ernest got up to pray at 3 a.m. for John and others. John confessed that he would not have been able to make it through the divorce without the friendship and support of Michael Ernest. We need to notice the "Moabites" in our lives. Those that are despised, ignored and neglected may become our means of redemption as Michael Ernest was for John.

Sometimes the means for our redemption is not what we may expect. There are times when we may need to say to ourselves, "wait a minute, is this somehow in God's plan?"

There is one final wait a minute in this story. As I said earlier, the story received the form we know during the post-exilic period of Ezra and Nehemiah. Ezra and Nehemiah called for the people who had remained in Judea to divorce the foreign wives they had taken. This story says, "wait a minute!" Remember King David, the greatest king in Israel's history? His great-grandmother was a foreigner. Does God truly want us to cast off foreign wives?

This story was a reminder that even the greatest King of Israel was not ethnically pure. Perhaps Ezra and Nehemiah were not correct in claiming God wanted ethnic purity. Maybe God wanted purity of religion, that is, religion that cares for the orphans, widows, and resident aliens. God wanted pure, complete love and loyalty, not ethnic purity.

When we begin a course of action for our lives or our church, there may be wait a minute times. Times when a different way may be presented to us. Times we may need to reassess the best way. We need to be aware of times God may be saying, "wait a minute, make sure you are doing what I am calling you to do."
