

Announcements from the Pastor

As we begin the new year, there is a need for people to participate in the Sunday service. You may participate in the following ways:

- 1- **Greeters:** Being in the gathering area at 10:30 to greet people as they enter, especially visitors; to orient visitors- location of bathroom, to stay for time together, nursery etc.; to give visitors a visitor's card so we can have contact information; to check the attendance sheet (this is so we can have a record of attendance and for tracing if there is a COVID situation.).
- 2- **Nursery:** Since in our virtual visit video we say we do have a nursery available, we need volunteers to keep the nursery, at least 2, not from the same household, each Sunday. This is in accordance to Safe Sanctuary Guidelines and the volunteers would have to have a background check. If there are no children the nursery workers may come into the service at 11:15. The speakers in the nursery are working so you may hear the service.
- 3- **Readers:** To read the scriptures, except the sermon text, and lead the Psalter.
- 4- Audio- Visual: While Marie Stiles and Chris Derrick do a great job with this, we need more people to learn to use the system. It is fairly easy, even John can do it. You can learn it by sitting in with Marie and Chris a couple of weeks.

There will be sign-up sheets for these in the Gathering Area or contact John or Tom Geddens.

As the new Omicron variant is on the rise we strongly recommend wearing face coverings during Church services and other activities except when eating.

Baptism of the Lord

Baptism is one of the two Sacraments Methodists recognize; the other is Holy Communion. These are the Sacraments considered to be ordained by Christ. The Sacraments are means of grace, ways in which we experience God's grace.

Baptism is a sign of washing away the guilt of our sin. In infant baptism, it is the guilt of the original sin, not individual sin. So, both infant and adult baptism are signs of God's grace being poured out upon us, cleansing us from sin. But baptism is much more than just a washing away of sin.

Baptism is a sign of our initiation into a covenant with God. We enter into the covenants God made with Noah, Abraham, Israel, Moses, and David. We enter into the new covenant made through Jesus. As we enter into the covenants, our relationship with God is restored.

As this relationship with God is restored, we become heirs to the Kingdom of God. We sinners are adopted by God into the family of God. Our relationship with God is not a contractual covenant but a familial covenant. It is a parent-child relationship.

As we enter into this familial relationship, we enter the Body of Christ, the church. We enter the church universal. We become brothers and sisters with all who follow Christ. Like most families, there are differences between siblings, thus there are many denominations but all have one God.

By Baptism God cleanses us from the state of sin and the guilt of our sins. God brings us into the divine covenant. God claims us as Children of God and brings us into the divine family. We are born anew and begin a new life in Christ. Baptism is a sign of God's cleansing, restoring, adopting, and renewing grace being continually poured out upon us from the time we leave the womb.

As we receive God's grace, we respond to God's grace. Baptism as a means of grace doesn't mean an end but a beginning. Baptism is a sign of the beginning of a new life in Christ. It is a sign that we are one with Christ and therefore we live a new life. This new life is represented in the vows we take at our baptism, the vows which we will reaffirm later in the service today. These are vows we take before the whole body of Christ, the church.

So let's take a look at these vows., these promises we make as we enter into the covenantal relationship with God as a member of the divine family.

We renounce the spiritual forces of wickedness. We renounce the forces of Satan that lead us to sin. These forces may be temptations fueled by jealousy, greed, selfishness, and prejudices that lead to our propensity to sin.

We reject the evil powers of this world. We reject the political powers that oppress. We reject the social powers that keep people from being as God created them. We reject the cultural powers that attempt to use God's word to justify evil. These evil powers may be obvious, like Hitler, or may be very subtle, like when as a social worker at Bryan, I was pressured to discharge patients before the discharge plans were finalized, and patients ended up on the streets.

We repent. We turn away from those spiritual forces and evil powers and turn our faces toward God. We turn our backs to the world and live according to God's will.

We accept the freedom and power God gives to resist evil, injustice, and oppression. We understand we cannot resist evil, injustice, and oppression by our own power. Our propensity to sin is too great, so we receive God's power to resist sin. This power is only available for us when we freely ask for and receive it. The first step in any twelve-step program is to admit that one is powerless to overcome so it is turned over to a higher power. With God's grace, we receive the power to overcome evil, injustice, and oppression in our lives and the world. We freely accept God's power.

We confess that Jesus Christ is the one through whom we are saved and restored into a relationship with God. It is not just that we believe this, but we trust that God is saving us through Jesus.

In response to this saving grace, we serve him as our Lord. We turn our lives over to Jesus and follow His leading. We let go of our will and follow His will.

We do not follow Jesus alone. We become part of a community known as the church. We are joined with other followers in transforming the world. We participate in God's restoration of creation with people of all ages, nations, and races.

By God's grace we can remain faithful members of Christ's Holy Church. We did not make a vow to be faithful to the United Methodist Church but to the whole body of believers. By baptism we remain faithful in the work of the Church in making disciples. It is not so much how we participate in the working of the Church but that we do participate in the work of the church according to the grace God has given us.

Most of all we serve as Christ's representative in the world. We re-present Christ to the world. We re-present Jesus in all aspects of our lives. We re-present Jesus in every place we go. We live in such a way that others see Jesus in us and are drawn to Jesus.

These are the vows we made or were made for us at our baptism. These vows are our sacred promises to God in response to the outpouring of God's grace upon us. They are not empty words to which we respond without thinking. As we reaffirm our Baptismal Covenant today, let us ponder each of these vows and live our lives according to our baptism of God's grace.
