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Shalom, John Who to Imitate

3/13/2022

Philippians 3:17-4:1

"Join in imitating me, and observe those who live according to the example you have in us."

Boy, that sounds like Paul has an ego. Imitate me. Paul must think he is perfect and these folks in Philippi should imitate him. It is not that I think Paul is a bad person to imitate, he is. But this phrase just rubs me the wrong way. It seems to say, "Look at me! I am a perfect example, so imitate me!"

While it may be easy to read this verse in that way, I do not think that is Paul's intent. I do not think Paul is even saying to imitate him. The word Paul uses to begin this verse, *summimetai*, is only used here in the whole Bible. It is a compound word from, *sun*, which means with or together with, and *mimeomai*, which means to imitate or follow (from which our words mimic and mime are derived). So what Paul is actually saying is not to imitate him, but to imitate with him, to follow with him.

Ok, enough of a Greek lesson for today.

The question then becomes who do we imitate? Before we get into that we need to look at the greater context in this letter. This chapter begins with Paul talking about how his good Jewish credentials are worthless. He states that he hopes to gain Christ and that his righteousness does not come from the law but through faith in Christ. He claims he wants to know Christ and the power of his resurrection. Through Christ, Paul has a right relationship with God, and his will is aligned with God's will.

As we consider Paul and the probable time and place of this letter, it seems that Paul would be a good person to imitate. This letter was probably written from Rome around 60 CE, near the end of Paul's life. Paul most certainly knew Christ. He saw Jesus on the road to Damascus. He certainly aligned his will to God. God had chosen Paul to be the one to bring the Gospel to the gentiles. He certainly succeeded in this according to Acts and the letters.

But in verse 12 of this chapter, Paul says that he has not obtained the resurrection from the dead or reached the goal. Paul says he continues to press forward to the goal of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

This heavenly call is not being called to heaven. The word translated as heavenly is more accurately translated as higher. So what Paul is saying is he is continually pressing forward to a higher call of God. This higher call of God is to completely align his will with God's will. It is seeking to develop such a relationship with God that your will is God's will.

Paul is in prison awaiting trial and probable execution. He knows that if he has aligned his will to God's will he will be transformed from the body that is humiliated in execution to the body of God's glory. This is what he is pressing toward, to be with God in glory.

That is our goal, to know the perfect love of God and for neighbor and to be glorified. We go on to perfection. This is one of the distinctive aspects of Wesleyan theology. We are justified by faith and then continue to sanctification and complete holiness which comes as we go into eternal life.

While it seems that Paul is saying to imitate him, he is not. He is saying to join him, to be a fellow follower of someone else, the one we should all imitate.

This passage we read today points back to Chapter 2 where Paul writes:

(P) ⁵ Let the same mind be in you that was^[a] in Christ Jesus,

⁶ who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God as something to be exploited,

⁷ but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave,

being born in human likeness.

And being found in human form,

⁸ he humbled himself and became obedient to the point of death even death on a cross.

⁹ Therefore God also highly exalted him and gave him the name that is above every name,

¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend,

in heaven and on earth and under the earth,

¹¹ and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father. (NRSV)

Paul is inviting the Philippians and us to join him in imitating Jesus. Imitate Jesus' humility. Even though Jesus was equal to God, he did not regard that equality as something to be exploited. He did not use his divine power for self-interest as we noted last week. Instead, he emptied himself. He made himself a nobody, with no reputation. He took the role of a servant.

We should imitate Jesus and humble ourselves. We should not seek self-interest but seek how we can serve others. Many of you imitated Christ by sitting with Bill Pearson and caring for him these past few weeks. We may imitate Christ as Pauline Wenner did, greeting people before the service, putting out the food at our meals, and working behind the scenes. We imitate Christ by helping neighbors, visiting the sick, feeding the hungry, and in any other humble way to serve others without recognition.

More importantly, join him in imitating Jesus' obedience. Jesus gave himself over and obeyed the will of the Father throughout his life. He obeyed his father to the point of death, even death on a cross. The Father's will was Jesus' will. Jesus obeyed the Father even though the consequences meant a painful, gruesome death. That was Paul's desire, to obey God completely even though it led to death.

We imitate Christ by giving our will completely over to God. This does not mean that we cannot question God. Sometimes questioning helps to clarify God's will. I read a new take on the poem *Footprints*. God is saying that in times where there was only one set of footprints he carried us and the deep furrows were times he dragged us kicking and screaming. We are to be completely obedient to God's will regardless of what the earthly consequences may be.

We may lose reputation. We may lose status. We may lose the adoration and possibly even the respect of some. We may even lose friendships. But we will gain the perfect love of God and are glorified in God's presence for eternity.

Therefore, we join Paul in imitating Christ. We humble ourselves, seeking to serve others instead of self-interest. We serve, not for our recognition but for God's glory. We may experience earthly loss when we are completely obedient to God's will, but we will gain God's glory.
