

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Hebrews 12:18-29

We have been shaken the past few months by earthquakes, particularly if you live in Elgin. These earthquakes are very disconcerting and disorienting. You are in a group when a quake occurs and everyone looks around saying, "Did you feel that? What was that?" It is very disconcerting when you finish writing your sermon and the earth shakes. You wonder, "Does that mean this is bad or this is good?"

After the quake, you stop and wait, wondering if another is coming. After a moment or two, you breathe a sigh of relief and go on about your business.

The writer of Hebrews compares the appearance of God at Mt. Sinai, where Moses was given the Torah, with Mt. Zion, the place where God's presence is on earth. The writer is making a comparison between the kingdom of the world and the Kingdom of God.

I want to make something clear before I go further. Neither I, nor the writer, are making a case for secessionism, that Christianity replaced Judaism. The New Testament does not replace the Old Testament but builds on the Old Testament. The foundation of Christianity is the Torah. Jesus said he came to fulfill the law not to abolish the law. The writer makes the comparison to show what is present and what is being revealed. The comparison is between the present kingdom of the world and the Kingdom of God being revealed through Jesus.

In Exodus 19 the Hebrews reach Mt. Sinai. The people are to prepare themselves for three days. On the third day, there was a loud blast of a trumpet. A thick cloud surrounded the mountain! Thunder boomed! Lightning flashed! The Lord descended in fire and smoke went up! The whole mountain shook violently! God came down and the people were afraid.

That is how God appeared to the Hebrews at Mt. Sinai. They perceived a mighty, unapproachable God that would destroy even an animal that touched the holy mountain. They trembled in fear

The kingdoms of the world were ruled by an unapproachable elite. After David, the rulers of Israel and Judea became focused on maintaining wealth and power rather than executing God's justice. Rule by an unapproachable elite continued as Israel and Judea were ruled by the Assyrians, Babylonians, Persians, Greeks, and Romans. The common people were oppressed and lived in fear. Even those of higher status lived in fear of losing honor and status.

It is not much different throughout most of the world today. A small unapproachable elite rules by fear and oppression. Even in the US, many feel that once the politicians get our vote, they become inaccessible. To show how our democracy works, a teacher gave an assignment for her students to write their congressperson. She hoped that some would receive some sort of response, but not a single student received any response.

While the Hebrews perceived an unapproachable God at Mt. Sinai, the God of Zion was approachable. The God being revealed through Jesus is a God who is among us. God speaks and relates to us. God invites us into the heavenly Kingdom. God is out there somewhere and down here among us.

Throughout history, God has shaken the earth. God has shaken Israel and Judah. God has shaken Assyria, Babylon, Persia, Greece, and Rome. God has shaken all earthly kingdoms. God has shaken the church. According to the prophet Haggai, "For once again, in a little while, I will shake the heavens and the earth and the sea and the dry land; and I will shake all nations, so that the treasure of all nations shall come..." (2: 6-7) This is the passage which the writer quotes in verse 26. God will give a final shake and all creation shall be revealed as originally intended.

I liken this to an archeological dig. The dirt from each particular stratum is dumped into a large box with a wire mesh bottom. The box is shaken and the dirt and dust fall through the wire bottom. What is left are possible artifacts that give a clue to life in that place at a certain time. The shaking reveals the artifacts by separating them from the dirt and dust.

God will give all creation a final shake and the Kingdom of Heaven will be revealed. While earthly kingdoms can be shaken and are temporal, God's kingdom cannot be shaken and is eternal. We who remain faithful despite whatever hardships, doubts, temptations, or sorrows we may endure, will receive the invitation into that unshakable Kingdom. We will enter into God's perfect eternal Kingdom.

So let us give thanks for this Kingdom we are receiving. We give thanks by offering to God acceptable worship. Then what is acceptable worship of God?

Some will say acceptable worship is traditional with liturgy and hymns out of the hymnal only. Some will say acceptable worship is contemporary, the louder the better. Some will say acceptable worship is quiet and dignified. Some will say acceptable worship is expressive and Spirit-filled.

The answer is all and none. These only look at the form of worship. I have been in traditional, contemporary, quiet and loud, worship that was and was not, acceptable to God. The form of worship does not matter. The attitude with which we approach worship is what matters.

We worship God with reverence and awe. Both words in Greek can mean godly fear. We fear the power and awesomeness of God. We fear God's judgment, like a young child whose father says sternly, "Come here" for God is a consuming fire.

But God's consuming fire is not to destroy but to purify. God may sternly say come here but when we come, God wipes the dirt off our faces and gives us a big hug. Our fear becomes honor and respect, so acceptable worship is a service that demonstrates our thanks, honor, and respect for God.

A final note is worship also means service. So our service to others is also done with reverence and in honor and respect to God. We give thanks to God in our service to others.

We give thanks to God for shaking us, for separating that which is not part of God's Kingdom from us. We give thanks through our Sunday Service and our service to others. We remain faithful to the promise of God that the unshakable eternal Kingdom is being revealed and we may live in it.
