

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Hebrews 13: 1-8, 15-16

The writer of Hebrews finishes his argument. By faith, one receives an unshakable kingdom, the Kingdom of God. This Kingdom comes as one endures and remains faithful. One lives in the unshakable Kingdom of God instead of the ever-changing kingdom of the world.

Now the tenor of the epistle changes. He shifts from the abstract to the practical. He exhorts the audience to live according to the way of the Kingdom of God instead of the kingdom of the world. The church to which the epistle was written was to re-present the Kingdom of God to the world. As the church, we are to represent the Kingdom of God to the world today. Therefore, these exhortations apply to us today.

Let mutual love continue. Rather than agape, the writer uses the term philadelphia which means love of brother or sister. Within the Kingdom of God, we are to continue to love as a family. We are a family, the family of God. We are to continue that love within the community. We are to re-present the Kingdom of God as a loving family.

This familial love of the Kingdom of God differs from the familial love of the world. The familial love of God's Kingdom is extended to those outside the Kingdom. We are to show hospitality to outsiders. By showing hospitality some have entertained angels. This is a nod to Abraham and Sarah in Genesis 18, Lot in Genesis 19, Gideon in Judges, and other times when angels appeared in Jewish history. Hospitality to strangers has been a command of God from the time of Exodus, "You shall not wrong or oppress a resident alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt. (Exodus 22: 21)"

We are to extend the love of God's family to those outsiders. We are to invite others to come into God's Kingdom and be adopted into God's family as we were. We are to invite them to participate fully in our lives and the life of the church. One of the five practices of fruitful congregations described by Bishop Robert Schnase is radical hospitality. If hospitality is not extended mutual love cannot continue but by practicing hospitality the Kingdom, and the church, will grow.

Remember those who are in prison and being tortured. Remember those who are oppressed and suffering. But this exhortation goes way beyond moments of silence or "thoughts and prayers". Remember those who are in prison <u>as though you were in prison with them.</u> Remember those who are being tortured <u>as though you yourselves are being tortured.</u> We do not just remember those who are oppressed and suffering, we share their oppression and suffering.

One of my favorite quotes is from *To Kill a Mockingbird*. Atticus is talking to Scout on the front porch and he tells her, "You never really understand a person until you consider things from his point of view... Until you climb into his skin and walk around in it."

We are to climb into the skin of the parent whose child is dying from malnutrition. We are to climb into the skin of the black person, walking past a memorial honoring a way of life that enslaved their ancestors. We are to walk around in the skin of the homeless person. We are to walk around in the skin of those who are oppressed and suffering, so we may walk with them in their oppression and suffering. We are to have compassion as Jesus had compassion.

My Old Testament Professor once gave us a handout that pointed out ten gifts God gave with the Ten Commandments. The gift equated with the command not to commit adultery was intimacy. There is a Holy intimacy between two people God joined together. This intimacy is emotional, spiritual, and physical. Therefore we honor marriage and the physical intimacy that is part of marriage.

The final exhortation is to remain free of the love of money or possessions. This also relates to the command not to steal. We can be content with what we have for we know God gives us what we need. The issue about money is not so much about being wealthy and having things but being content with what we have. I remember a line from a Sheryl Crow song, "It's not having what you want. It's wanting what you've got." We want what we've got and that is all we need.

Let mutual love continue by being hospitable, and extending familial love to those outside the family. Remember and suffer with those who are in prison and suffering. Honor marriage and the intimacy God gives. Be content with what we have. These really don't seem that hard on the surface, but in practice they are very difficult. They are all practices that go against the kingdom of the world.

Whereas the writer exhorts the audience to extend familial love beyond the bounds of the family, the kingdom of the world says to keep it all in the family. Sadly that attitude still permeates churches today. Let's love and nurture ourselves but let's not extend our love to those outsiders.

Have compassion and walk with those who are in prison and suffering. The kingdom of the world says, "Ignore them. They are getting what they deserve." Yes, they may be getting what the world says they deserve but is that what God says they deserve?

Hold marriage in honor and keep the marriage bed undefiled. The world, then and now, says use all you can to get ahead, even sex. If it feels good do it. If you want someone other than your spouse, go for it.

Keep free from the love of money? Yeah right. Both then and now, the rule of the world is to get all you can by any means you can and never be satisfied until you get more than the next guy. Unfortunately, you may always find someone that has something you want.

Our exhortation is to live counterculturally. We live in the unshakable kingdom that is eternal, not an earthly kingdom that is shaken and temporal. We live according to the rule of God who will never leave or forsake us, not an earthly king who is here today and gone tomorrow. We live for that which is unshakable, steadfast, and eternal. We extend the love of our family beyond the walls of the church and to all people we meet, inviting them to come and be a part of our family, God's family.
