From the Stump 12/4/2022

Isaiah 11:1-10 Second Sunday of Advent

In the sideyard of the parsonage, there are two crepe myrtles. These trees were not there when we moved in 2018. We did not plant those trees. They came up from the stump of trees that had been cut down. Life remained in that stump and sprung forth. Now they are growing and flowering each season. New life came from something that appeared dead.

At the time of Isaiah, social and political turmoil was rampant. The social, political, and religious structures of Judah were under attack. The Assyrians and Egyptians vied to bring Judah under their influence. Eventually, Jerusalem fell to the Babylonians. The kings, with the exceptions of Hezikiah and Josiah, turned from worshipping YHWH and worshiped Baal. Instead of justice, the kings served their own interests, not that of the people.

Judah would eventually be cut down. The Davidic monarchy, which God promised would last forever, would be nothing but a stump. All would appear hopeless.

All appears hopeless. We have said or thought that during our lives. Throughout history, there have been times when all may have seemed hopeless. There have been times in the church when all may have appeared hopeless. Even now some would say things appear hopeless. There seems to be nothing but a stump left.

There is nothing left but a stump but Isaiah proclaims a message of hope! Isaiah proclaims that from that stump a shoot will come out. From this stump will come a new king and a new order, a different kind of king and a different order.

The Spirit of the LORD shall rest upon this king. The Hebrew word for spirit is the same word for wind and breath. The breath of the LORD shall fill this new king. The breath of the LORD will fill this new king with wisdom and understanding. This new king will have the knowledge and ability to make the right choices according to understanding the LORD's will. The breath of the LORD will fill this new king with counsel and might. The new king will have diplomatic and military skills. The new king will know the LORD and be in awe of the LORD.

This new king will judge with righteousness. The King will hear the case of the poor and meek. He will make decisions based upon the LORD's intent, not upon how good one looks or how much they can line his pockets. He will bring up the poor and meek rather than continuing to oppress them. His word shall carry over all the earth and the wicked will not be able to stand against him.

The core of the new king's rule shall be his relationship with God and complete faith and trust in God. The new king will rule the way God wants him to rule, not the way the rich and powerful want him to rule.

This new king shall usher in a new order. In this new order, predator and prey will live together. A little child shall lead these animals, though the Hebrew actually reads a young boy will lead them. Also, a baby will play over the hole of a poisonous snake and a toddler will put its hand in a den of snakes. In neither case will the snakes strike.

We tend to look at the phrase, "A little child shall lead them" meaning the little child is the king but this is not the case. These images of children in this passage are humans at their most vulnerable time of life. The most vulnerable would have nothing to fear in this new order. There would be nothing to fear. Think about how wonderful it would be where there is no fear. There would be no fear, for nothing in the world would be created to harm another.

This new order is a restoration of God's original order of creation. Genesis 1: 29-30 reads,

"God said, 'See, I have given you every plant yielding seed that is upon the face of all the earth, and every tree with seed in its fruit; you shall have for food. And to every beast of the earth and to every bird of the air and to everything that creeps on the earth, everything that has the breath of life, I have given every green plant for food. (NRSV)"

Perhaps this is not so much a new order but a return to God's originally created order.

How might this new order look? Edward Hicks, a Quaker minister and painter, painted sixty-two known paintings based on this passage. One is on the screen. You notice all the animals mentioned in the passage living together. You see the young boy, the toddler, and the baby. You also notice in the left background he depicts William Penn and the Quakers making a treaty with the natives. This reflects that in the new order there will be peace among creatures and peace among humans. There will be peace in the created order and peace in the social and political order. As the old African American spiritual sings, "we ain't gonna study war no more."

Who is this new king that will usher in this new order? To the Jews, it is the coming Messiah. To Christians, it is the Messiah that has come, Jesus. Jesus came into the world, fully human and fully divine, to restore God's order to the world. Too often we focus on Jesus coming into the world to save souls; we forget that Jesus came to save the world. As Jesus says in John's Gospel, "For God so loved *the world* that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed God did not send the Son into *the world* to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him." (John 3: 16-17).

This is our Advent hope. Our hope is that through Jesus, God is bringing about a new order or perhaps restoring the original order of creation. Our hope is that peace will reign and there will be no fear. This restoration of created order began with the birth of Jesus and is continuing until this new order is accomplished. Our hope is that Jesus is saving not only us from sin, but the whole creation from sin. We hope for the peaceable Kingdom that is rising from the stump of Jesse's tree.
