

Salt, Light, Law 2/5/2023

Matthew 5: 13-20

Last week we noted *The Sermon on the Mount* was Jesus' teachings to the disciples. These teachings were his instructions about being his disciples. These instructions were for disciples in Matthew's church and instructions for us as the church today.

In the passage we read today, Jesus tells the disciples on the mountain, the disciples of Matthew's church, and us as the church today that they are three things in the world. The "you" in these verses is emphatic. He is not saying what you will be, what you can be, or what you may be. He tells the disciples what they are to the world.

First, you are the salt of the earth. Salt adds flavor to food. Food tastes better with a little salt. Before refrigeration, salt and smoking were the main ways to preserve meat. Salt was very valuable in the ancient world because it was a flavoring and preservative. Salt was part of the temple sacrifices. Leviticus 2: 13 reads, "You shall not omit from your grain offerings the salt of the covenant with your God; with all your offerings you shall offer salt."

As the salt of the earth, we are valuable to God. We offer ourselves to God as a living sacrifice. We preserve the teachings of Jesus by passing along the Gospel and living according to the Gospel. We are the seasoning God uses to get the recipe of creation right.

You are the light of the world. We need light to see. Light exposes good and bad. Light serves as a guide and beacon. Ships are guided by a lighthouse, not a dark house. We follow the light when life seems dark.

As the light of the world, we are to be seen so our lives attract others to the Gospel. The church functions as a community that attracts others to join the community. The church is the light that brings others to be reconciled to God.

You are a city on the hill. From far away, a city on a hill is easily seen by travelers. The city becomes the destination for wanderers. A city in a valley cannot be seen until one crosses the mountain. Travelers will set the course for the city that can be seen rather than one they cannot.

As the city on the hill, the church is a visible community. It is a community people can see and set their course. The church becomes the destination for those wandering spiritually.

All these, salt, light, and a city on the hill, point out Christianity as what John Wesley calls a social religion. Salt cannot add flavor or preserve if it is not used. A light under a bushel basket will not be seen. A city in a valley is not seen. As Christians and the church, we are to be seen. We are to be involved in our communities, meeting the needs of our community. Private piety is salt that loses its flavor, a light hidden under a basket, and a city no one sees.

How are we salt, light, and the city on a hill? Verses 17-20 provide a transition to how we are what Jesus is saying we are. Jesus says that he has not come to abolish the law and the prophets. The Law is the Torah. The prophets are the books of the Former Prophets Joshua through Kings and the Latter Prophets Isaiah through Malachi. This was the central core of the Hebrew Bible. When the New Testament writers refer to scripture they refer to these writings.

The Torah is God's instruction to Israel from God about living in a relationship with God and with others. The Prophets look ahead to the accomplishment of God's restorative work for Israel and creation.

Jesus is not coming to abolish or replace the Law. He is not bringing a new law. He is not changing even the minutest stroke of the law. At the same time, he is not going with the status quo. He fulfills the Law. He makes the Law fully understood. He makes the intent and meaning of the Law fully known. The Law and the Prophets are fully known through him. At this point in the text, he is looking back at the Hebrew Scriptures and forward to his teachings that follow today's text.

Jesus ends with this rather shocking statement. To enter the Kingdom of Heaven the righteousness of the disciples must exceed the scribes and Pharisees. The disciples must do what God requires better than the scribes and Pharisees. The scribes and Pharisees espoused strict adherence to the letter of the Law. To exceed the righteousness of the scribes and Pharisees, the disciples of Jesus, including us, must go beyond the letter of the Law and look to the heart and meaning of the Law. The heart and meaning of the law are what follows in the rest of *The Sermon on the Mount* which we will explore next week.
