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Matthew 21: 1-11. 26: 17-27:2, 11-61 Palm/Passion Sunday

This Sunday begins with triumph! Jesus rides into Jerusalem on a donkey and a colt, fulfilling Zechariah 9:9. The crowd spreads their cloaks along the road, a sign of loyalty just as Jehu's followers spread their cloaks on the paved steps when he was appointed king of Israel in defiance of Jehoram.

The crowd saw a king like David coming to save them. Jesus was coming in the name of the Lord. He was coming to rescue them from evil and oppression. The Jews had been praying for this Son of David for 500 years. Since the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple by Babylon, the Jews had been waiting for the Son of David to overthrow the foreign oppressors. Now, the Son of David was entering the city. The salvation of the Jews has come. Triumph!

Then, a few short days later, the triumph is gone. The king the crowd so joyously welcomed, hung on a Roman cross. Sunday, the crowd shouted, "Hosanna". Thursday, they shouted, "Crucify him". In a few hours, this king, Jesus, was betrayed, denied, and deserted. He went from accolades to abuse and execution.

How could this happen? How could the crowd who so fervently welcomed Jesus turn so quickly and viciously? How could the disciples, who followed him from Galilee, betray, deny, and desert him?

Perhaps the answer is misguided expectations. The expectations of the crowd and the disciples were not played out. What they expected was not what they got.

Much has been discussed and written about Judas' motives for betraying Jesus. Matthew portrays Judas as remorseful when he recognizes his sin. In the musical *Jesus Christ, Superstar,* Judas betrays Jesus because he fears Roman reprisals if Jesus goes too far. Some speculate Judas wanted to force Jesus to demonstrate his power. Whatever his motives, Judas' expectations of Jesus were misguided.

The disciples may have expected Jesus to demonstrate great signs that he was the Son of God. They may have expected everyone to welcome and follow Jesus as they did. A groundswell of support for Jesus that would completely overwhelm the authorities and the Romans may have been their expectation. What they expected did not happen, so they deserted and denied Jesus.

The crowd expected a king like David. They wanted a military leader who would overthrow the Romans and their oppressive puppet rulers. Jesus was to lead a revolution that would free them from evil oppressors. There was no call to arms, no revolution, so the crowd shouted crucify him.

Jesus did not do what Judas, the disciples, or the crowd expected, dashing their hopes. Their hope was based on expectations that were misguided in two ways.

Their expectations were misguided in what they awaited. They longed for a king who would free them from evil and oppression. They wanted freedom from surface evil and oppression. They expected political freedom.

Jesus did not ride into Jerusalem to free the crowd and disciples from evil and oppression. He rode into Jerusalem to free all from evil and oppression. Jesus' purpose was not to save just Israel but all nations. He did not come to free them from Rome. Jesus rode into Jerusalem to free the crowds and all from evil in its full depths.¹ Jesus came to free all from the depths of sin which lies within humans. Jesus came to free all from the evil within that leads to oppression and exploitation. Jesus gave the crowd and disciples what they expected but at a much deeper level. Jesus went to the core cause of what they wanted.

The crowd, Judas, and the disciples were also misguided by how Jesus would fulfill his purpose. The crowd expected a military revolutionary. Even though Jesus told the disciples and Judas he must suffer and die, it seems they did not believe him. They probably expected some show of power to prove Jesus was the Son of God.

Jesus was enthroned on a pagan cross, not in a palace. Jesus suffered shame and humiliation. Jesus was abused and abandoned. Jesus was executed like the worst of criminals. Jesus was not glorified the way one would expect.

Our expectations of Jesus may be misguided. We expect Jesus to meet our needs. We want Jesus to be our savior. We forget that Jesus is the savior of the world. To save the world, Jesus may want us to sacrifice. We may be called to sacrifice our money, time, talents, and, yes, our lives so Jesus can save the world. We may pray for what we want: healing, a new job, church growth, etc. However, Jesus gives us much more. He gives us what we need, a close intimate relationship with God.

Nor are our prayers answered in the way we expect.

While I was teaching Sunday School at Mt Hebron, Ward Smith was in the class when he was home from his job with UMCOR. Ward had been assigned to go to Ghana in West Africa. The Sunday before he left, I asked the class to lay hands on Ward and we prayed for his safety and success.

Ward contracted malaria. He was flown home and admitted directly into Lexington Medical Center. He spent several weeks in the hospital and more at home recovering.

The next time I saw Ward I said, "Ward, I am sorry but it seems our prayer was not answered."

Ward replied, "Well, John, I could have died."

I expected God to keep Ward safe and to have a successful mission. Instead of keeping Ward from getting sick, God gave Ward the strength and medical care to overcome the disease. Ward received the assurance that he could face whatever happened to him in any assignment.

Too often our misguided expectations lead to what we perceive as a tragedy. This week leads from Sunday's triumph to Friday's tragedy. But the week is not over.
