Through the Dark Valley

# 4/30/2023

## Psalm 23

This Psalm is the most familiar of all Psalms. Psalm 23 is the first Psalm most of us learned. We can recite it without thinking. We may not think about the meaning of the Psalm because the words roll off so easily.

This Psalm is about God's presence with us, especially during dark times. I have read this Psalm too many times in the past 15 months as it is part of the funeral liturgy. The Psalm begins with the pastoral image of the LORD as our shepherd but the tone changes in the fourth verse. The tone changes from green pastures and still waters to dark valleys, even death.

"Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me." (KJV)

"Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; your rod and your staff- they comfort me." (NRSV)

Both translations are acceptable and capture the feeling of the valley. The psalmist is not walking through a rolling, green valley but through a deep gorge. The sides are steep, nearly perpendicular. Sunlight penetrates only when the sun is at its highest point. The rest of the time, the valley is in shadows. In these shadows, robbers may lurk, ready to steal, even if they must kill. Yes, the psalmist is walking through a dark, deadly place.

We find ourselves walking in dark valleys, places in our souls where there seems to be only darkness and little light. Many are going through the dark valley of grief, having lost a loved one to death. Some may be going through the dark valley of a terminal illness. Some may be experiencing the darkness of a breakup of a relationship. Some may be experiencing economic darkness after the loss of a job. Some may be experiencing the darkness of mental illness and depression. We may be going through other dark valleys, as these are just a few.

The keyword in the first part is through. Even though we may be walking in a dark valley, the LORD will get us **through** the dark valley. The LORD, our shepherd, does not leave us in the dark valley. The LORD gets us through the dark valleys.

The LORD's rod and staff provide comfort. The rod can mean a symbol of authority, like a scepter. The LORD has authority over all the darkness. Therefore, the psalmist, and we, cannot fear evil because the LORD has power over evil. The Lord has power over all dark forces in our lives.

The staff is a long pole with a crooked end. The shepherd would use the staff to guide the sheep by laying it on the opposite side of the way he wanted the sheep to go. For example, if the shepherd wanted the sheep to go to the left, he would place the staff on the sheep's right and give a gentle tap. If the sheep did not respond, the taps may get a little harder. The shepherd used the crooked end of the staff to bring back a sheep that wandered from the flock. The shepherd would hook the end around the neck and gently pull the sheep back to the herd.

The Lord's rod provides comfort because it symbolizes the LORD's authority over evil. The LORD's staff guides us through the dark valleys of our lives. As we remain aware of the LORD's tapping and guiding, the LORD leads us through the dark valleys.

But sometimes, it is difficult to discern the LORD's guidance. What we expect the LORD's staff to be may not be the reality. The LORD's staff may be human hands and human minds.

I will never forget a session with one of my clients at the Mental Health Clinic of Jacksonville. Annie suffered from schizophrenia and had been hospitalized at Northeast Florida State Hospital several times. In this particular session, I asked Annie if she attended church. Annie looked me in the eye and said, "John, let me tell you about the church."

"OK, Annie, tell me about the church."

Annie said, "I go to church. The preacher says to come forward, he will lay hands on me, and I will be healed. I go forward, he lays hands on me, and I am healed. I go home and throw away my medicine."

"Then I end up back in the State Hospital."

"I get out of the State Hospital. I hear the preacher on the TV. The preacher says lay your hands on the TV, and you will be healed. I lay my hands on the TV. I am healed, so I throw away my medicine."

"Then I end up back in the State Hospital."

"I get out of the hospital. I listen to the preacher on the radio. The preacher says lay your hands on the radio, and you will be healed. I lay my hands on the radio. I am healed, so I throw away my medicine."

"And I end up back in the State Hospital."

Then Annie says to me, "John, I realized that God gave me the medicine and this clinic to keep me well."

The LORD's staff to guide us through the dark valley is not some miraculous healing like Annie initially thought. The LORD's staff is often doctors, nurses, psychologists, and social workers to get us through our dark valleys. The LORD's staff may be a financial advisor or career counselor. The Lord's staff may be a support group. The Lord's staff may be medicine or some medical treatment. Be aware of the LORD tapping and guiding you through your dark valley.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month. If you are walking in a dark valley of depression, intrusive thoughts, or irrational fears, please seek help. Talk to your doctor, contact the local Mental Health Center, the National Alliance for Mental Illness, or the Mental Health Association. If you have suicidal thoughts call 988, a national crisis hotline. God does not want you to stay in your dark valley. The LORD will get you through the Valley. You need to follow the guidance of the LORD's staff to where you need to get through the valley.
