

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## Acts 1: 6-14

The resurrected Jesus appeared to the disciples for forty days of preparation. He instructed the disciples about the Kingdom of God. He ordered them to stay in Jerusalem to wait for the promise of the Father, and they would be baptized with the Holy Spirit in a few days.

Now Jesus and the disciples came together on Mt. Olivet. The disciples asked Jesus if this was the time when he would restore Israel. Would the coming of the Holy Spirit mark the miraculous restoration of Israel? Is this the time the host of heaven comes and destroys the evil empires? Jesus was the resurrected Messiah after all. The disciples believed Jesus, the Messiah, would lead a mighty army and restore Israel so God's people would come together in God's city.

Jesus told them it is not for them to know the time or season this will take place. What will happen is they will receive the power to be Jesus' witnesses by the giving of the Holy Spirit. They will be Jesus' witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Jesus told them Israel will be restored by them being his witnesses, not a heavenly army.

After Jesus told them, he was lifted in a cloud and taken out of their sight. He had been preparing the disciples for this moment. He would no longer be with them in body, but they would receive the Holy Spirit. They continued to gaze up into the sky, watching Jesus go away.

While the disciples gazed into heaven, two men appeared. They told the disciples Jesus would come again. The disciples quit looking up and turned their gaze down to the world below. They came down the mountain to do what Jesus told them.

Many of us have had mountaintop experiences when we felt Jesus right here with us. We felt his presence and his love. We may have experienced deep emotion. A sense of peace and calm may have come over us. Perhaps, our hearts were strangely warmed like John Wesley at Aldersgate. Whatever our experience, we knew Jesus was with us.

But that deep emotion may diminish. We don't feel calm and peaceful. Our hearts become cold. We may feel Jesus is fading, going away from us. So, we keep gazing up, trying to see Jesus, waiting for him to come back.

The two men told the disciples to quit looking up. They would not see Jesus if they kept looking up. The disciples were to come down off the mountain and do as Jesus commanded. They came down off the mountain, went back to the upper room, and waited. A few days later, they received the Holy Spirit and through the Spirit, they knew Jesus remained with them. They were enabled to be Jesus' witnesses in Jerusalem, Judea, Samaria, and the ends of the earth.

After our mountaintop experiences, we may need to quit looking up and look down to find Jesus. An old Rabbi was once asked why so few people were finding God. He replied that people are not willing to look that low. Jesus was born in a stable, and God is especially concerned for the poorest, the lowliest, the lost, and the neglected.<sup>1</sup>

When we look down, we see the needs of our neighbors. We respond by meeting the needs of our neighbor as Jesus commanded. We are Jesus' witnesses to the world today. When we engage in ministry with the least, we see Jesus in them and they see Jesus in us. We see Jesus when we look down.

But if we keep looking down, we become overwhelmed by the needs in the world with much poverty and homelessness. Some people must choose either life-giving medication or food. There is so much illness, depression, addiction, and suicide. Violence is so rampant. Every day, normal places- the grocery store, school, concerts, clubs, and even places of worship- have become scenes of violence. We feel like Sisyphus, rolling a boulder up a hill only to have it roll back down. As we look down, we can lose sight of Jesus.

We can lose sight of Jesus looking up. We can lose sight of Jesus looking down. How are we supposed to keep sight of Jesus if we lose him looking both up and down?

We keep Jesus in our sight when we maintain a balance of looking up and looking down. We see Jesus by looking up in prayer, Bible study, worship, the sacraments, meditation, fasting, and other acts of piety, both individually and communally. We see Jesus as we serve to meet the needs of our neighbors. We see Jesus in the eyes of the poor, the grieving, the sick, the prisoner, and the broken. We see Jesus in our acts of mercy.

When we look up or down too much, we lose sight of Jesus. When we spend time on our acts of piety and neglect our acts of mercy, we lose sight of Jesus because we fail to keep the command to love our neighbor. When we spend too much time in our acts of mercy and neglect our acts of piety, we lose sight of Jesus because we fail to keep the command to love God.

When we are involved in our acts of mercy and begin to feel that our cup is empty, we need to stop. We need to look up to God in piety, letting God refill us with the life-giving waters of the Spirit. An empty cup is no good for someone thirsty. We look up to the fount of every blessing. We look up receiving renewal and refreshment.

When we stay in our acts of piety but feel we are getting no closer to God, we need to stop. We need to look down to see the needs of our neighbors. We need to stretch our hands down in service with the least of these, so we may see Jesus in their faces.

We can always see Jesus when we look up and down. We see Jesus when looking up to God to refill our cups and looking down to empty ourselves in service to others. As we maintain this balance, looking up when we need to look up and down when we need to look down, we can always see Jesus.
