

# Genesis 21: 8-21

The story of Hagar and Ishmael is one of the most poignant stories in the Bible. It is full of pathos. Many people find it disturbing. So, it is often overlooked.

However, I found comfort in this story. During this time when many churches are separating from the United Methodist Church, reading this story gave me peace in the chaos. I found consolation at the end of the story.

Hagar's story begins in Chapter 16. Since Sarah is past child-bearing years, she gives Abraham her Egyptian slave girl, Hagar. Hagar becomes pregnant. Here the story becomes ambiguous. Hagar may have gotten a bit uppity or Sarah may have gotten a bit jealous. Regardless, Sarah sees Hagar as a threat. So, with Abraham's permission, she punishes Hagar. In response to her punishment, Hagar runs away into the wilderness. An angel of the LORD finds Hagar and tells her to return to Sarah and Abraham. Hagar returns and bears Abraham a son, named Ishmael.

The years have passed. Sarah has given Abraham a son, Isaac. Isaac has been weaned. He has survived those early years and will grow to be an adult. The promise of God was fulfilled so there was a celebratory feast.

At the feast, Sarah notices Ishmael and Isaac together. Again, the story becomes ambiguous. The Hebrew word used could mean mock, tease, or simply play. Regardless, Sarah sees Ishmael as a threat to Isaac. Sarah asks Abraham to cast out Hagar and Ishmael. Abraham is distressed by Sarah's request, but God tells Abraham to do as Sarah asked.

Here the pathos begins. Abraham sends Hagar and Ishmael away. He does provide them with bread and water. Hagar and Ishmael wander in the wilderness. The water runs out. Hagar casts Ishmael under a shrub and went a bowshot away for she could not bear to watch her son die.

Hagar's situation appeared bleak. She had no food or water and was in the middle of the wilderness with no place to go. She did the only thing she could. She cried.

God heard Ishmael's and Hagar's cries. An angel appeared to Hagar, telling her that God had plans for Ishmael. God was going to make a great nation of him. Then God opened Hagar's eyes. She saw a well and filled the skin with water. She and Ishmael continued their journey, and God was with them.

God was with them. Even though Sarah and Abraham rejected Hagar and Ishmael, God did not. Ishmael had twelve sons, mirroring the twelve tribes of Israel. God blessed Hagar and Ishmael.

Some of the same pathos filled this year's Annual Conference. The day the vote was taken for the 113 churches to leave the conference was somber. No one had any sense of celebration or victory. A hushed sadness filled the auditorium. I felt an overwhelming sadness that continued after the conference.

This story of Hagar and Ishmael happened to be the Old Testament reading from the Revised Common Lectionary for this Sunday. As I was reading it in preparation for today, I had an aha moment. Even though United Methodists are separating, God is not rejecting either group. God is not rejecting the Traditionalists and God is not rejecting the Progressives. God will bless both the Traditionalists and the Progressives, and continue using them.

God had promised Abraham that he would be the Father of a great nation. This promise would be fulfilled through the son of Abraham and Sarah. But God also promised Hagar that a great nation would come from Ishmael.

The separation of Isaac and Ishmael was by humans, not God. Sarah and Abraham were both culpable in casting Hagar and Isaac out into the wilderness. Sarah could no longer tolerate seeing the child of Hagar, who she saw as a threat to Isaac.

The separation in the United Methodist Church is a human separation. Those in the Traditionalist camp cannot tolerate the potential movement of the church regarding LGBTQ+ issues. They chose to separate.

God blessed both Isaac and Ishmael. God did not reject one over the other, God used both.

God will not reject the Traditionalists or the Progressives. God will bless both the Traditionalists and the Progressives. God will use both for the forwarding of the Kingdom.

The story we read today does not end with separation. As Paul Harvey used to say, "Now, the rest of the story."

In Genesis 25: 7-11, we read about the death of Abraham. Verse 9 reads, "His sons Isaac and Ishmael buried him in the cave Machpelah..." Isaac and Ishmael came together to honor and bury their father.

Though the Traditionalists and Progressives have separated over the LGTBQ+ issue, we remain together in many ways. We still worship the same God. We state the same creeds. We sing the same hymns. We still celebrate the same Holy Communion. We both experience God's prevenient, justifying, and sanctifying grace. We still believe in the Triune God. We believe in the Incarnation. We still have the same Father, John Wesley.

Though it may seem that the Traditionalists have rejected the Progressives and the Progressives have rejected the Traditionalists, God has rejected neither. Regardless of which camp you may fall, remember God has not rejected the other. As God has not rejected either camp, neither can we reject our opposing camp. God will bless and use both for forwarding the Kingdom in ways we can never comprehend.

So let us not reject our brothers and sisters in opposing camps. And know that even though we may not be able to live together, we can continue to love alike.
