Matthew 11: 16-19, 25-30

A few years ago, A. J. Jacobs wrote a book entitled, A Year of Living Biblically. The book documented his attempt to live according to all the rules in the Bible. He began by extracting all the rules in both Testaments. He filled 72 pages with the 700-plus rules he found. He attempted to live according to all the rules in the Bible for one year.

Some of the rules he found easy, some he found baffling. Some made sense in Biblical times but were not applicable today. Some he realized after further study were metaphorical, not literal. The bottom line: he could not live according to all the rules in the Bible for a year, much less a lifetime.

I suspect the ordinary person of Jesus' time would have the same problem. For many, then and now, the law becomes a stumbling block that keeps one from coming before God. It is too difficult to keep all the rules in the Bible and continue to live a normal life. The Priests, Pharisees, and Sadducees may have found keeping the law easier because they kept themselves separate from everyday life. Even for them, the law became a stumbling block to doing good. Look at the many controversies with Jesus regarding working on the Sabbath.

Jesus recognized the law placed a burden on the ordinary person. Jesus tells all who are weary, tired, and exhausted to come to him. Jesus says, "If you are tired of trying to keep all these laws then come to me." Jesus says, "My yoke is easy, and my burden is light."

This sentence contains four Greek words that are rarely used in the Bible. The words are translated as yoke, easy, burden, and light. Yoke is not only the implement used to control oxen when plowing but also metaphorically means submission. Ease comes from kindness and goodness. The burden is the load one has to carry. Light means the load is easy to bear. The translation could read, "For submission to me is easy because I am kind and good, and my load is easy to bear."

Jesus does not mean if we submit to him, we will never have any difficulties. We will have our difficulties and times of trial. Financial woes may occur. People we love will die, some suddenly and tragically. We are not immune to sickness or accidents. Bad things will happen to us. These burdens are easy to bear because Jesus bears them with us. When we yoke ourselves to Jesus, he bears our burdens with us just as two yoked oxen work as one to bear their burden.

Isn't that Good News, my friends? When we submit ourselves to Jesus, he bears our burdens with us. This Good News is not revealed to the wise but to infants, not infants in a life stage sense but the unsophisticated and trusting. God's will is to reveal this Good News to the ordinary people. The ordinary people understand and accept this Good News while the wise do not.

The ordinary people get Jesus' Good News while the wise do not. The Jesus that eats and drinks with tax collectors and sinners does not fit into the concept the wise had of the Messiah. Jesus is a drunkard and glutton, a rebellious son, who should be stoned to death (Deuteronomy 21: 19-21).

To ordinary people, tax collectors, and sinners a messiah who would carry their burdens with them is incredibly good news. God is not weighing us down with laws and rules we cannot keep. God is working with us in the muck and mire of our everyday lives. GOOD NEWS!

One of the best cartoons I have seen recently depicts the disciples on the mountain after the ascension of Jesus. The remnants of the cloud which carried Jesus to heaven are in the upper left-hand corner of the panel. The disciples are looking at each other saying, "Ok, love God and love everyone. That seems simple enough." But one of the disciples is looking down to the lower right-hand corner of the panel. A group of scholarly-looking people is coming up the mountain. The disciple says. "Uh Oh, here comes trouble. It's the theologians."

We often complicate Jesus' simple request to submit to him and let him carry our burdens with us. There must be more than simply loving God and loving each other. We understand legalistic rules- the dos and don'ts- better than we understand love. We must have laws! We must have an order! Often our rules are stumbling blocks to loving God and loving others. We want to keep ourselves separate and "holy". Keeping the law becomes more important than loving. We do not see and respond to the needs of our neighbors.

The revelation of God's Good News comes when we submit ourselves to Jesus. The good news is God gives rest to those who are burdened, weary, tired, and exhausted. God yokes himself with us and carries our burdens with us.

I often hear people say, "God never gives you more than you can handle." While that may seem like good news, it misses the mark. The Good News is that God carries our burdens, trials, and tribulations with us. Being yoked to God we can handle, survive, and thrive despite anything life and the devil may throw at us.

That is God's Good News for the people. God is for the people. God walks with people, carrying burdens with them. God carries our burdens with us.

The burden Jesus places on us is easy to bear. The load is to love God and others. We follow God's law because we love God. Our attitudes and actions are dictated by the self-giving love of Jesus, not adherence to 72 pages of rules and laws. Jesus showed us how to love. Let us take off the yoke of legalism and take on Jesus' yoke of love. Life is much easier when we submit to Jesus, let him carry our burdens with us, and receive a load of love.
