Believe, Confess, Tell 8/13/2023

Romans 10: 5-15

Many scholars consider the letter to the Romans to be Paul's masterpiece. The epistle's themes are many and complex. N.T. Wright compares it to a Beethoven symphony1. To better understand today's passage in Romans, we need to examine the church to which the letter is written.

Unlike his other epistles, Paul was not writing to a church he founded. Paul had not even been to Rome. The consensus is that the letter was written in the mid to late 50s, probably from Corinth. Paul is preparing to travel through Rome on his way to Spain. I suspect there might have been more letters back and forth between Paul and the church as Paul plans his journey. Paul appears aware of the issues in the church. Also, the church wants to know more about Paul's "theology."

Tradition holds that Peter founded the church in Rome. However, there is no clear evidence of Peter being in Rome before 50 CE. Most likely the church was founded by Jews who lived in Rome and heard the Gospel during pilgrimages to Jerusalem. Some Jews who were in Jerusalem on Pentecost may have founded the Church. Rome was originally a Jewish Christian congregation with a smattering of Gentile converts. In 49 CE, Emperor Claudius expelled all Jews from Rome. Nero rescinded this edict in 54 CE. Now these Jewish Christians returned to a church that was predominately Gentile. The issue was: "How do these Jewish and Gentile Christians live and worship together?"

That question still resonates in the Church today: "How do people with different religious backgrounds and experiences live and worship together?" Denominational loyalty is not as big a factor when people look for a church today. Here in Trinity, we have people who grew up Baptist, Presbyterian, Catholic, and probably others. We grew up with different beliefs and traditions. We may have ingrained beliefs on worship, baptism, and communion. Our ingrained beliefs affect our views on social and theological issues. How do we worship and be a community when we have different beliefs?

Paul's theme throughout the letter to the Romans is to focus on the core beliefs. In the passage we read today, Paul points to the core of the Christian faith. He is making the point to both the Jewish and Gentile members of the congregation to focus on their shared beliefs.

The first point is that the word of God in the Law and Christ is near. The quote from Deuteronomy 30: 14 in verse 8 reads, "The Word is very near to you; it is in your mouth and your heart." The word of faith is that God is near to us. We believe, trust, and have confidence in God's faithfulness.

This trust in God's faithfulness includes believing that God raised Jesus from the dead and those, who are saved, will be resurrected. This is not a surface belief but a belief that comes from the heart, the very depths of one's being.

Through this trust in God's faithfulness, one confesses that Jesus is Lord. Confession is to say plainly that Jesus is Lord. Saying that Jesus is Lord means that one has Jesus as the ruler of their life. Jesus is the Lord of all things and all people. One becomes a servant of Jesus and glorifies God in everything they do. Confession that Jesus is Lord is not just saying it, but living it. John Wesley states that confession implies outward religion as believing does inward.2

As one believes with all their heart, they are justified and put in a proper relationship with God. One who confesses with their mouth is saved. Faith leads to justification and confession which leads to salvation.

Who is this salvation for? The Jewish Christians might think it is for them because they are God's chosen people. The Gentile Christians might think it is for them since they did not reject the Messiah. Paul says there is no distinction. There is no Jew or Gentile, no slave or free. Salvation is for all. Remember we said Jesus is Lord of all things, which means all people. Therefore, everyone who calls upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. To call upon the name does not mean to cry out to God in times of trouble but to pledge allegiance and live according to the will of God. By pledging allegiance to God and living according to God's will, one shall be saved.

I know this is dense, with a lot packed into these few verses. Your head is probably spinning as mine was as I wrote this sermon. Paul's arguments are not linear but more like a spiral finally reaching his point.

What Paul is saying to those Jewish and Gentile Christians in Rome is to focus on the essentials. God is near and available to us. Through faith, trust, and confidence in God, God restores our relationship and aligns our will with God. We confess Jesus as our Lord and live our lives in obedience to him. We pledge ourselves to God and live according to God's will. Everyone who does this shall be saved. It doesn't matter if you are Jew or Gentile, slave or free, you shall be saved. This letter and his letters to the Corinthians indicate that Paul believed there were essential matters, like the above, and opinions. Paul would say to the Jewish Christians if you feel that following the traditions brings you closer to God, do it. He would say to the Gentiles you don't have to follow the traditions. But do not let your differences interfere with God's mission for you as a community.

I believe Paul would say this to a church today, maybe this church. Do not let your differences in traditions and opinions keep you from doing the mission God has for you.

Paul points out people cannot call upon God if they do not believe. How can those who have never heard believe? How are they to hear if there is no one to proclaim? Paul is explaining to the Jewish Christians his mission to the Gentiles. God commissioned Paul to tell the Good News that God is near and desires a relationship and salvation for the Gentiles who cannot believe because they have not heard.

Christianity and Church have been such a big part of our culture and growing up, that we forget many have not heard the Good News. For many people, their first contact with Christianity or Church is what they see in the media or on social media. Often Christians do not project a very Christ-like image. An interviewer asked Gandhi if he hated Christ. He responded "I like your Christ, I do not like Christians. They are so unlike Christ." Our mission is to spread the Good News so those who have not heard may hear and believe. The Good News is not our doctrines or stance on social and political issues. The Good News is that God is near. God desires a relationship with all. God desires for all to call on his name as Lord, so all may be saved.

Paul did not preach in crowded stadiums or churches. Paul did not preach strict adherence to a set of doctrines or laws. Paul built relationships with people. He told them the story of his experience and revelation of Christ. Paul lived his life under the example of Christ.

We do not have to know theology or doctrine to tell the Good News to those who do not believe. We begin by living our lives aligned with God's will. We live under the example of Christ. We tell the story of our experience and relationship with God through Jesus. We tell the story of how Jesus came into our hearts. We tell and live what we believe and what we confess. Our mission is not to teach doctrine but tell the story of the Savior, the story of Jesus and His love.
