

Don't Get Sucked In 10/22/2023

Matthew 22: 15-22

This passage is often cited as the argument for the separation of church and state. Jesus says to give Caesar the things that are Caesar's and God the things that are God's. It sounds like Jesus is saying to keep religion and politics separate. However, the message of this passage has nothing to do with the relationship of religion and politics. This story has two major points.

Before we go further, we need a little historical context. In 63 BCE, the Roman general Pompey entered Jerusalem as a "peacekeeping" force. In 6 CE, Judea became a Roman Provence. The Jews began having to pay taxes to Rome in Roman currency. This was a major theological issue with the Jews because the Roman coins had an image of the emperor and the inscription, "Tiberius Caesar, august son of the divine Augustus, high priest." The fact that the coin had a human image and inscription declaring Caesar as divine would be blasphemous to the Jews. The Zealot movement rose in opposition to this tax. Romans hung many Zealots on crosses throughout the countryside, a sight young Jesus may have seen.

So, paying taxes to Rome was a real hot-button issue at the time of Jesus. Feelings ran high on the issue and the "wrong" answer would lead to dire consequences. A modern equivalent would be abortion, same-sex marriage, or the ordination of homosexuals.

This passage is the first effort in a series by the religious establishment to entrap Jesus. This story is also found in Mark (12: 13-17) and Luke (20: 20-26). Though there are some slight differences in each Gospel, Jesus' response is the same. Jesus asks for the coin used to pay the tax. He says to give to the emperor what is the emperor's and to God the things that are God's. Jesus does not engage with the Pharisees. He does not get sucked into the Pharisee's trap.

This is not the only time Jesus refused to engage with his adversaries. When the Pharisees question Jesus' authority to teach (Mt. 21: 27-33, Mk. 11: 27-33. Lk. 20:1-8), Jesus does not engage but asks by whose authority did John the Baptist teach? In the story of the woman caught in adultery (John 8: 1-11), Jesus writes in the sand rather than engaging with the Scribes and Pharisees. Jesus did not get sucked into arguments with his adversaries.

Not to engage in spurious debates is the first point of this story. Often rifts are caused in churches because of arguments over everything from the color of the carpet to the present LGBTQ issues. I am not saying the LGBTQ issue is unimportant, but engaging in long arguments only leads to anger and hurt. The UMC stance is the same as it has been for decades and cannot be changed until the 2024 General Conference. If the stance changes local church is affected; long arguments are unproductive. Most people have their minds made up already. They are not going to change. Arguments and debates are only going to lead to increased anger and hurt. Let's get the facts, make a decision, abide by it, and agree to disagree with love.

Enough about that; this brings us to the second point. Why did Jesus not engage with the Pharisees? Why didn't he argue with them and prove them wrong? Why does he say to give the emperor the things that are the emperor's? That sounds like he is saying to give to the world what the world wants.

Jesus is saying, "Don't get distracted by what the world wants." If the world (the emperor) wants you to pay tax with a particular coin; pay it, and get on with giving to God what is God's.

What is God's? We are. We are God's creatures. God created us in the divine image. We all are children of God. We are children of God whether we are Christian, Jew, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist, or atheist. We are children of God whatever our race, ethnicity, or nationality. Even if we are lesbian, gay, bisexual, transsexual, asexual, or straight, we are children of God. Every person on the face of the earth is a child of God, created in the image of God.

We must remember whose we are. We are God's and therefore we give ourselves to God. We give ourselves to God to do the work God has for each of us to bring about the Kingdom of Heaven. Our ultimate loyalty is to God, not the nation. Jesus is saying, "You may give what is the emperor's, but your ultimate loyalty is to God."

We should not engage in spurious debates because they distract us from giving ourselves to God. We are distracted from doing the work God wants us to do for the Kingdom.

Bishop Holston's frustration with the issue of disaffiliation is that it has distracted churches from doing Kingdom work. Churches have spent so much time, energy, and money debating the issue that they could spend spreading the Gospel to their community. They could have been feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, welcoming the stranger, caring for the sick, and visiting the imprisoned.

We may be United States citizens, but we are God's creatures. We belong to God. We give to our nation what the nation wants, but our ultimate loyalty is to God. We are to work for God's kingdom over any earthly kingdom. The Kingdom of God will defeat the kingdom of the world, not by the conventional means of money, power, and rockets but by God's love and God's power over all kingdoms, even the kingdom of death<sup>1</sup>.

Let us not get sucked into debates and controversies. Let us remember we belong to God and should give ourselves to work for God's kingdom at all times and in all places.
