Soon, and very soon, we are going to see the King.

That King is the incarnate Son of God sent by God into the world. Jesus is the presence of God in the world, establishing God's rule on Earth. Satan and all other kings are pretenders.

God created the earth and all therein, including humans. God created all people in the divine image. It stands to reason that only the Creator can rule creation. God, the creator, sent the Son into the world to save the world.

Some believe that God will save the ones predestined for salvation. God will save the few who are truly righteous. Some say God will save only Christians, and some say only their brand of Christians.

But God is the creator of all and desires for all to be saved. God gives divine grace to all people. John Wesley flatly denies the doctrine of predestination. In his sermon "Free Grace" he points to several texts:

"Destroy not him with thy meat for whom Christ died (Rom. 14:15)

a clear proof that Christ died, not only for those that are saved, He is "the Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world (John 1:28);" the whole world (1 John 2:2);" "He (the living God) is the savior of all tasted death for every man (Heb. 2:9).¹ "Destroy not him with thy meat for whom Christ died (Rom. 14:15) but also for them that perish; He is the "Savior of the world (John 4: 42);" "He is the propitiation, not for our sins only, but also for the sins of men (1Tim, 4:10);" "He gave himself a ransom for all (1 Tim. 2:6)" "He

Wesley believed that God gave grace and salvation to all people.

If that is the case, why am I up here preaching to you? Why are you sitting here listening to me ramble on for 15-20 minutes? I know you might be getting a nice little nap, but wouldn't you be more comfortable in your Lazy Boy? Why don't we just go home?

King Jesus is coming to save, but he is also coming to judge. He is coming to judge who enters the Kingdom of Heaven and who will not. Those who are righteous will enter eternal life; the unrighteous will go away to eternal punishment.

For Matthew's audience, the righteous were those who stayed alert and were prepared, like the wise bridesmaids. They were those who continued to work to expand God's Kingdom, like the servants who multiplied their talents. They were the ones who remained true to the faith even in the face of adversity and uncertainty. They were the ones who responded to God's grace by living the message of the Gospel and doing God's will. They fueled their faith to be drawn closer to God and know God's love better.

This is our criteria for judgment. We stay awake and alert. We fuel our faith to be drawn closer to God. We do the work God has for each of us to expand God's kingdom. We respond to God's grace by living the message of the Gospel. We remain true to the faith even in the face of adversity and uncertainty.

Then we come to today's passage, and wait a minute! This passage says we will receive the Kingdom if we feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, welcome the stranger, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and visit prisoners. Does that mean we just have to do good, and we will enter the Kingdom?

At first glance that may seem to be the case, but let's take a closer look.

The Son of Man will come in his glory and sit on his throne. All the nations will be gathered before him. Remember, Matthew was writing to a primarily Jewish Christian community. The word, ethnos, translated as nations, refers to gentiles. It may also refer to pagans or heathens. These are the people outside the Jewish Christian community. (Also, remember at the time of Matthew, Christianity was considered a sect within Judaism.)

So, oh boy, those non-believers will get their just desserts. But Jesus separates them like a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. He says to those on his right that they are blessed and will enter the Kingdom prepared for them from the foundation of the world. They are blessed and enter the Kingdom because when Jesus was hungry, thirsty, a stranger, naked, sick, and imprisoned they took care of him. They ask, when? Jesus replies whenever you did it to the least and the marginalized people.

To those on his left, Jesus says, get away from me and get ready for the fire. They ask, why, and Jesus replies because they did not care for him. They did not care for the least and the marginalized.

This passage is not about how the community, the church, will be judged, but those outside the community. Those inside the community will be judged by their alertness to the coming and perseverance in doing good deeds.² Those within the community do good deeds in response to God's grace. They were aware of God's prevenient, justifying, and sanctifying grace. Those outside the community are judged by how they respond to the needs of their fellow humans.

Though the specifics of Judgement differ, there is one underlying element to the King's Judgement. In both cases, those inside and outside the community, are judged by the love command.³ Those inside the community know the love that comes from God and respond by loving their neighbor. Those outside know God's love but do not know the source. Though they do not know the source of love, they love their neighbor.

By this passage, we see that salvation is for all regardless of their conception of God. Those who know and profess Christ and live according to the command to love can come before the throne with the assurance of salvation. Even though they may not know the source of their love, those who love are also saved. But those who reject God's love, whether or not they profess Christ, are doomed to punishment.

We know the source of love. We bask in God's love daily. We live out God's love by loving our neighbors, particularly the least and marginalized. Therefore, we have the assurance of our salvation.
