Two Signs

Matthew 2: 1-12 Mark 1:4-11

This Sunday is unusual because two significant events in the Christian Calendar fall on the same weekend. Yesterday, January 6, was Epiphany, the final day of the Christmas Season marked by the coming of the Magi. Today is the Baptism of the Lord Sunday when we focus on Jesus' baptism and the beginning of his ministry.

I confess I could not decide which to focus on this Sunday. The two events are important because both represent signs of God's grace and working in the world. Today, we will explore the two signs in these events.

Before we go further, let's define the meaning and purpose of signs. A sign suggests the presence or existence of a fact. A sign may provide direction or information. In a theological sense, a sign is an action that makes the invisible visible. A sign points to or points out something. An arrow is a sign that tells which direction to go to get somewhere. A stop sign tells us where to stop.

The sign of Epiphany is the star. The star pointed the Magi to the child born to be king of the Jews. They saw the star rising in the East. From their studies, they knew what the star meant. The star pointed to the newborn king of the Jews.

The Magi followed the star as it made its way across the heavens. They made the long arduous trek to Jerusalem, then on to Bethlehem. The star gave the Magi directions to the Child. They followed the sign of the star to the place where Jesus lay. The star was a sign of guidance, leading the Magi to the child.

Baptism is a sign. It is a sign of God's grace at work in our lives. Baptism is a means of grace. It is a way we experience God's grace.

Baptism is a sign of God's prevenient grace that surrounds us from birth. It is a sign of God's action in removing the taint of sin from us through the cleansing water of baptism.

Baptism is a sign of justifying grace. Through the water of baptism, we are cleansed from the guilt of our sins. We are justified, and our lives are realigned to God's will.

Baptism is a sign of sanctifying grace. We are cleansed by the water of baptism and made new. We more clearly reflect the image of God in which we are created. By grace, we are drawn closer to God and come to know the perfect love of God and for others.

I know some may argue that an infant cannot be justified and cleansed of sins they have not committed. Therefore, infants and children should not be baptized. Remember baptism is a sign of God's grace. It is an action, the pouring of water which makes visible the invisible working of God's grace throughout one's life. While we are baptized once with water, we are continually baptized in God's grace. Baptism is the sign of the continuing action of God in our lives.

Since baptism points to the continuing action of God's grace in our lives, Methodists do not rebaptize. Rebaptism is basically saying that God did not work the first time. This is not true, for God is always working in our lives.

Baptism is a sign of identification. As Jesus came up from the waters of the Jordan, a voice said to him, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." We are identified as a child of God. We are beloved, and God is well pleased with us. Baptism is a sign of God's claim on us as God's children.

Thus, baptism is a sign of our initiation into the family of God, the church. We are members of the church universal. This is why Methodists do not rebaptize someone who joins from another denomination if they have been baptized. They are already members of the church; they just need to make the vows to join the Methodist church.

The star of the Magi and baptism are signs. They are signs of God working in history and God working today. They are signs we need to be on the lookout for as we go through life.

We may not think that God gives signs to us. Often we may long for a sign but we do not see any. But as the old song by the Five Man Electrical Band, goes, "Signs, signs, everywhere are signs..." There are signs of God's working everywhere.

We see God working in doctors going into areas of infectious outbreaks to curtail the spread of the diseases. We see God working through aid workers in refugee camps of people displaced by war. We see God working through the hands of CNAs in nursing homes, caring for the elderly. We see God working in teachers. We see God working every day through us, children of God who reflect the image of God.

We receive signs of God's guidance like the star that led the Magi to the manger. The Magi saw the star and knew what it meant. Others saw the star but did not know what it meant. Often, we may not recognize the signs of God's guidance at the time.

In the movie *Up In the Air,* George Clooney plays a corporate downsizer. He told people their jobs were terminated and explained the termination package. At one point he was working with a man who was distraught about losing his job. Clooney asked the man if there was something he always wanted to do. The man replied that he wanted to run a restaurant. Clooney pointed out that he now had the time and, with the termination package, the resources to start a restaurant. Losing the job gave the man the opportunity to do something he always wanted.

God's signs are not always bright stars. But God gives us signs. We just need to look for them and know what they mean.
