

John 1: 43-51

Before starting, I will be naming some towns and types of people with the question "Can anything good come from...?" Please understand that I am using these as rhetorical illustrations and do not intend to put down anyone. If I do so, I beg your forgiveness; it was unintentional.

Jesus was on a roll! He had just come onto the scene, and he was gathering disciples. John pointed to Jesus as the Lamb of God, and two of John's disciples left him to follow Jesus. One, Andrew, went and told his brother, Simon, that they had found the Messiah. Andrew brought Simon to Jesus and Jesus renamed him, Peter.

The next day, Jesus found Phillip and told Phillip to follow him. Phillip was excited! He found his friend, Nathaniel, and told him, "We have found him about whom Moses in the law and also the prophets wrote. We have found the Messiah! He is Jesus, son of Joseph, from Nazareth!

Suddenly, this rapid movement and gathering of disciples came to a screeching halt. For the first time, there was resistance to Jesus' calling. Nathaniel was skeptical, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?"

"Can anything good be out of Nazareth?" This question brought Jesus' momentum to a screeching halt. Rather than dropping everything and following Jesus, as everyone else so far, Nathaniel questioned if Jesus was the Messiah.

Nathaniel rejected Jesus as the Messiah. The basis upon which Nathaniel rejected Jesus was nothing he heard Jesus say. His rejection was not about anything Jesus did. It was about Jesus' birthplace, his heritage.

Why did Nathaniel think so little of Nazareth? We do not know. Maybe, Nazareth was perceived as a lower-class village, like some consider mill towns. Perhaps, it was simply that Nazareth was another insignificant village in Galilee. Nathaniel could have thought that the Messiah would come from Jerusalem, not some backwater place like Nazareth. Whatever the reason, Nathaniel resisted Phillip's witness because of where Jesus was from.

We may think that is stupid. Resisting someone's witness to Jesus because of where they are from? Nathaniel had not even seen or spoken to Jesus. How could he resist Phillip's witness to Jesus? Nathaniel is an idiot!

Before we get too far into righteous indignation, let's stop for a minute. In Clarence Jordan's *Cotton Patch Gospel*, Nathiel's question is framed as, "Can anything good come from Valdosta" (besides football teams)? People across the river may say, "Can anything good come from West Columbia?" We may say, can anything good come from Swansea, Hopkins, or Red Bank?" We may say can anything good come from Mississippi? Can anything good come from Mexico? Do we resist someone's witness because of where they are from?

We may resist someone's witness because they are from a different place from us. Not necessarily geographically, but a different culture, race, ethnicity, or lifestyle.

Can anything good come from someone who is dark-skinned? anything good come from someone who wears a turban or sari? has purple hair?

Can anything good come from someone who wears a dashiki?

Can anything good come from anyone who is covered with tattoos, has body piercings, or Can anything good come from somebody who is different from us?

We may resist the witness of someone who has a questionable past.

Can anything good come from someone who has been in DJJ or DOC? Can anything good come from someone who has been in foster care? Can anything good come from someone struggling with addictions or mental illness? Can anything good come from a poor person or a homeless person?

Are we quick to reject someone's witness because of where they are from, what they wear, the color of their skin, their lifestyle or history, personal or family? I will be honest. I have. I have been quick to consider the foreign doctors I worked with as not as smart as the American doctors. I also quickly learned that this was not the case as there were many American doctors I would not refer anyone to. I have been quick to tune out preachers and presenters who were different. I have been quick to resist someone's witness because they were different and if we are honest with ourselves, we all have.

Notice how Phillip dealt with Nathaniel's resistance. He did not try to argue the issue. He did not reject Nathaniel. He did not admonish Nathaniel or try to defend himself. He simply offered an invitation, "Come and see." He overcame Nathaniel's resistance by inviting Nathaniel to experience what he had experienced with Jesus.

As Nathaniel was coming toward Jesus, Jesus told Nathaniel what he was, "an Israelite in whom there is no deceit." Nathaniel recognized the truth, Jesus knew him even before Jesus met him, even before Phillip called him. At that point Nathaniel confessed the truth; Jesus was the Son of God, the King of Israel. Nathaniel knew that something good came out of Nazareth, the Massiah.

Even though we may be resistant to the witness of others, if we accept their invitation, we may see Jesus. When we let go of our preconceived notions of who is "good" and who is "bad", our resistance will break down. We can accept their invitation and see Jesus in them.

If we remember that all people are created in the image of God, we can see Jesus in all people. We can let go of our resistance and hear their witness. We may respond to their invitation to see Jesus in the way they see Jesus. We may see ourselves the way Jesus sees us. We can see Jesus more clearly, and confess Jesus as the Son of God and King of all people.

May we let go of our preconceived notions, for something good, the Messiah, may come from anywhere.
