The 43rd season continues as we present our winter concert on Sunday, February 25, 4 p.m., in the Auditorium at Airport High School. Selections include a variety of music from American Classics to River Dance to our usual march or two. This concert features our talented saxophone players in "What a Wonderful World" made so famous by Louis Armstrong. We lived on a farm about five miles from downtown Americus, about six miles from Americus High School. Not only was it too far to walk to school, but it was also too dangerous since the farm was on a busy highway.

In Georgia, you get your learner's permit at fifteen. You could only drive with an adult in the car with you.

When I was a sophomore in high school, I could not drive to and from school by myself. Unless I could get a ride with a friend, I had to wait until someone could pick me up. I spent many afternoons waiting, sometimes for a long time. I rarely became anxious because I knew someone was coming to pick me up. I knew which direction they would be coming. I knew which cars to look for: a Dodge Challenger, a blue pickup, or a mustard yellow Impala. I knew who was picking me up by the car they drove. Even though I became impatient, I knew someone was coming to pick me up.

The Prophet told the people to wait for the LORD. The historical context of Isaiah shifts in chapter 40. Jerusalem had fallen, and its citizens were sent into exile in Babylon. Persia defeated the Babylonians and became the dominant power in the region. The possibility of an end to the exile was more real with the Babylonians defeated. The tone of the book changes from doom and gloom to words of comfort and hope.

But the people have been in exile for many years. They think the LORD has abandoned them; God no longer sees their condition of exile. Their punishment has gone beyond their transgression, not just the length of their exile but the hardship and oppression put upon them by the Babylonians. They are faint, weary, and exhausted.

The prophet reminds the people that the LORD is the Creator. The LORD has dominion over all the Earth, even foreign princes. Kings come and go but the LORD is an everlasting God. The LORD does not faint or grow weary. Even in the prime of life, humans faint and grow weary, but the LORD does not.

The Prophet tells the people to wait for the LORD. The Hebrew word translated as wait means to strain the mind in a certain direction with an expectant attitude. The Prophet is telling the people to exert their minds and focus on the LORD, with the attitude of deliverance. We are in a brutal exile but the LORD will deliver us. The LORD will renew our strength. We shall rise like eagles. We shall run and not be weary. We shall walk and not faint all the way back to Jerusalem!

We may find ourselves in exile, not in a foreign country but in a state of separation. We may feel separated from God. We may want to cry, "My God, My God, Why have you forsaken me?" We may feel alienated from family and friends.

We may be in the exile of grief, questioning: Why did God take my loved one? Why did God leave me alone? Why did I lose my job and career? How did my marriage end in divorce? Our grief separates us from God and others.

We may be in the exile of mental illness or addictions. We may be unable to control our thoughts and emotions. We hide ourselves and our thoughts from others.

We may be in the exile of an illness. We sit through another procedure. We go through another round of therapy. We try yet another miracle medication.

We may be in the exile of social or economic factors. We may be in the wrong group or not have the money to keep up with the Jones'. There are so many ways we can find ourselves in exile, feeling cut off from God and others.

We find ourselves faint, weary, and exhausted. We can't fight it anymore and just want to give up the struggle. We won't make it back to Jerusalem.

We heed the words of the Prophet. We wait for the LORD. We focus our minds on God with the attitude that God will deliver. God will deliver us from our exile of grief, addictions, mental illness, illness, society, and economics. We may not know how or when but God will deliver us. Our deliverance may be through a support group, a new medication, or the right therapist or doctor. Our deliverance may simply be becoming part of a community. Our deliverance may be sudden or a gradual realization and changed perspective. We wait for the LORD.

No matter how hard we try, we cannot get out of our exile by ourselves. But when we wait for the LORD, the LORD renews our strength and never fails to strengthen us. We can mount up like eagles. We can run and not be weary. We can walk and not faint out of our exile and back to God.
