We Want to See Jesus

3/17/2024

John 12: 20-33

People were going up to worship. It was the Passover, the most important of the Jewish festivals. They were gathering to celebrate the liberation of Israel from slavery in Egypt.

Among those going up to the temple were some Greeks. They could have been proselytes, Greeks who had converted to Judaism, or diaspora Jews who lived in Greece. According to most scholarly thought, they were the former. These Greeks went to Phillip and said they wished to see Jesus. Phillip told Andrew, and then they went to Jesus.

Phillip and Andrew are involved in this story as a connection to the beginning of the Gospel. Andrew was one of John's disciples who followed Jesus (1:35-42). When the two disciples asked where Jesus was staying, he told them to "come and see." Andrew went and told his brother, Peter.

The next day, Jesus found Phillip and said, "Follow me." Phillip found Nathaniel, but he expressed disbelief. Phillip said to him, "Come and see." (1:43-46). The invitation in both callings was, "Come and see."

Phillip and Andrew were the first disciples to bring others to Jesus. Of course, these others were Jews. Now, Phillip and Andrew are bringing Greeks to Jesus. We can see the same invitation. The Greeks came to Phillip because they wanted to see Jesus.

They wanted to see Jesus. Let's examine what this wish entailed. Did they wish to lay eyes on Jesus? Did they just want Phillip and Andrew to say, "Over there, there he is? Did they want to see Jesus in the sense of seeing with their eyes? No.

Did they want to get close enough to touch Jesus and shake his hand? Did they want to have a brief word with him? Jesus, that was some entrance into the city. Did they want an autograph or a selfie? No, they did not want to see Jesus in any of these ways.

The word translated, see, carries a much deeper meaning than to observe with the eyes. It is the same word used in Chapter 1 in the invitation to "Come and see." The word means to perceive, understand, and come to know. They wanted to see Jesus so they could come to know and understand Jesus. They wanted to know Jesus.

I have seen many famous people: Neil Diamond, James Taylor, Billy Graham, and Dawn Staley, to name a few. I have shaken hands with Jimmy Carter, Joe Wilson, and Bernie Sanders. I had an autographed picture of Dan Reeves that he gave at our pee wee football banquet. I have said hi to George Rogers at the gym.

Kay and I were going to a Chris Thile concert in Greenville. Before the concert, walking up the street we noticed a man with a mandolin case slightly ahead of us. At the stoplight, we chatted with him until the light changed. It was Chris Thile.

Even though I saw, shook hands, and chatted with these people, I did not know them. I did not see them the way the Greeks wanted to see Jesus. The Greeks did not want to see Jesus; they wanted to know Jesus.

We all want to see Jesus. But do we want to see Jesus from afar? Do we want to settle for a quick handshake, brief conversation, an autograph, or a selfie with Jesus? Or do we want to see Jesus, to understand, and come to know Jesus?

I, and I hope you, only answer yes to the last question. We do not want to see Jesus from afar, from the nosebleed section of a concert. We do not want a quick handshake or brief conversation with Jesus. We do not want an autograph or a selfie. We want to perceive Jesus' presence in our lives. We want to understand Jesus' teaching. Most of all, we want to know Jesus.

Now, one would expect the story to continue with Jesus inviting the Greeks to be his disciples. Jesus would invite them to follow him, but he does not. He says, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified." What does some Greeks wanting to see Jesus have to do with him being glorified?

The answer to this question is found in verses 19 and 32. Verse 19, which ends Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, reads, "The Pharisees then said to one another, 'You see, you can do nothing. Look, the world has gone after him.'" In verse 32, Jesus says, "And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself."

The Greeks coming to see Jesus fulfilled the Pharisee's statement. The world is now coming to Jesus. Thus, begins the process of Jesus' glorification culminating with the crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension. Jesus being lifted up points to the crucifixion, as he is nailed to the cross and lifted off the ground, and to the ascension, as he is lifted up into heaven. Jesus being crucified is God's act of atonement to bring all humanity into oneness with God.

The Greeks wanted to see, understand, and know Jesus. Though the Greeks fade from the scene, we may infer they wanted to follow Jesus. Following Jesus means going where he goes, even to the cross.

We see Jesus and follow Jesus. We want to be Jesus' servants. As servants, we must follow him to the cross. We must lose our lives in this world by nailing it to the cross. When we nail our lives to the cross, we are given a new life. A life that is not of this worldly kingdom, but of God's Kingdom. We become citizens of the Kingdom that never dies.

Look at what Jesus says about his servants. First, we must follow him. We must live according to his way, not the world's way. Secondly, where he is, the servant will be. Jesus is in us and we are in him. Jesus is always with us. That is comforting, but there is something more powerful in that statement. Since Jesus is with the Father in Glory, we will be with the Father in Glory. As Jesus was glorified, we will be glorified.

To me, Glorification is not some great, ecstatic, life where we are awed by dazzling lights and beautiful melodies. Glorification is forever resting in God's love, peace, and presence.

We want to see Jesus. We want to understand and know Jesus so we may follow Jesus. We want to be Jesus' servants, to be with him always. We want to be Glorified to be in the presence of God and rest in divine love and peace forever.
