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John 20: 19-31

This story is popularly known as the story of Doubting Thomas. Thomas was not with the disciples when Jesus first appeared. When the disciples told Thomas, he said, "Unless I see the marks of the nails in his hands and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." Thus, he is called doubting Thomas.

There is one interesting detail indicating that the title doubting Thomas is incorrect. The word doubt never appears in this passage. I know you will say look at verse 27. Jesus says, "Do not doubt but believe." Even though that is how the NRSV translates the verse, it is not really accurate. A more literal translation is, "Do not be unbelieving but believing." or even better, "Do not be unfaithful, but faithful." This story is not about doubt and belief but moving from unbelief to faith.

Before we go further, let's take a moment to examine the difference between doubt and unbelief. Doubt is wavering or uncertainty, even when there is some evidence. Some people doubt climate change. Some people doubt the effectiveness of medications. Doubt implies that something may not be absolutely true, even if there is some evidence. The prosecutor in a criminal trial must prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. A jury cannot deliver a guilty verdict if there is a reasonable doubt. Doubt implies uncertainty.

Unbelief implies certainty. Lack of evidence leads to unbelief. I do not believe vaccines cause autism because there is a lack of reliable evidence. My unbelief that vaccines cause autism comes from a lack of evidence. Reliable evidence leads to belief. I believe in gravity because every time I drop something, it falls to the ground.

Thomas had no evidence other than word of mouth. The evidence we have in the Gospel indicates that Thomas was not the wavering, uncertain type. When Jesus said that he was going to Judea to raise Lazarus, Thomas said "Let's go" (11:16). Thomas was the type to ask questions so he could understand. In his final discourse to the disciples, Jesus said, "You know the way to the place where I am going."

Thomas stated the obvious, "Lord, we do not know the place where you are going. How can we know the way?"

Thomas didn't seem like the uncertain wavering type. He would want clarification and evidence, but he did not doubt.

Thomas was unbelieving. Thomas did not believe the disciples because he was not there. He did not receive the Holy Spirit. The other disciples saw Jesus. They may have touched Jesus' hands and side. They received Jesus' peace and the Holy Spirit. They had clear irrefutable evidence of the resurrection. Thomas had no evidence.

Now, Thomas was there when Jesus appeared. He received Jesus' peace. Though not explicitly stated, he probably received the Holy Spirit. He did not have to put his finger in Jesus' hand or side before he made the most emphatic confession of faith in the Gospel, "My Lord and my God!"

The Greek word for belief also means faith. It is one of those words that has multiple meanings in English. The word means belief, faith, and trust. It encompasses all those concepts.

This story of Thomas is not about doubt versus belief, but moving from unbelief to faith and trust. Thomas did not believe the disciples when they said they had seen Jesus. Thomas did not experience the resurrected Jesus that the others had. He could not believe, without the experience. With the experience of Jesus, Thomas quickly moved from unbelief to emphatic faith.

We move from unbelief to emphatic faith as we experience Jesus. We may first experience Jesus through the songs and stories in Sunday school. We have different experiences of Jesus. Some may have a dramatic experience like Paul on the way to Damascus. Some may have a warming of the heart like Wesley. We may experience Jesus daily through Bible study, prayer, and devotional time. We experience Jesus through worship and the sacraments. We experience Jesus by serving others.

With each experience of Jesus, we move from unbelief to emphatic faith. We grow deeper in love with God. We put our trust and reliance on God. We say, "My Lord, who I will obey completely, and my God who is the sole object of my worship". We move toward God.
