


Grieving with God Tuesday, May 14

Wednesday's Words Every Wednesday at 11:30 a.m.

Over the next few weeks, Wednesday's Words will focus on common sayings that might be harmful even though they are not intended to be. Some will be taken from Adam Hamilton's book *Half Truths*, others will be things I have heard people say during my career as a social worker, hospice chaplain, and pastor. If there is a cliche or something someone has said to you that has caused harm, let me know so we can explore what makes some of the cliches we say harmful.

Who Are We? 5/5/2024

Acts 10: 44-48

This passage is in the context of the much larger story of Peter and Cornelius. The story begins with Peter in Joppa. Cornelius, a centurion in the Italian Cohort, has a vision. An angel tells him to send to Joppa for a man called Peter. Cornelius sends a soldier and two servants to Joppa.

Peter also receives a vision while he is waiting for lunch. He sees a large sheet coming down from heaven, filled with unclean animals, reptiles, and birds. A voice tells Peter to get up and eat. Peter protests that he has never eaten anything considered unclean. The voice tells Peter, "What God has made clean, you must not call profane." The vision repeats three times.

While Peter was puzzling this vision out, the men Cornelius sent arrived. They called out, asking for Peter. A voice tells Peter to go down and meet them. After hearing of their mission, Peter goes with them to Cornelius' house. He begins telling Cornelius and his household about Jesus.

Before we go any further, let's look at the characters. First, there was Peter. Peter was a good Jew. He was circumcised and obeyed the Torah. Though it is not explicitly mentioned anywhere, we may assume he was baptized. He was one of the first to follow Jesus. Jesus said he would be the rock upon which the church would be built. Peter received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Peter was definitely one God would choose to use.

Cornelius was a Roman. He was a centurion, an officer, in the occupying Army in Israel. He was an uncircumcised Gentile. But he feared God, meaning he held the God of Israel in reverence. He might be what we would call a seeker today. He gave alms and prayed to God. He appeared to be a good man, but not one of God's chosen people. He would not be one circumsied believers think God would use.

The main actor in this story is God. God directs Cornelius to Peter. God gives Peter the vision and the command to eat unclean food. God tells Peter to go to Cornelius. God is very active in this story as we will see.

As Peter tells Cornelius and his household about Jesus, the Holy Spirit falls upon all in the household! They began speaking in tongues and extolling God, just as Peter and those with him did at Pentecost. The circumcised believers with Peter were astounded! They could not believe that the gift of the Holy Spirit was given to these Gentiles. How could these uncircumcised members of the household of an officer of the Roman Army receive the Holy Spirit? They did not think God would give the Holy Spirit to these people, but God did.

Peter, recognizing the actions of God, asks, "Can anyone withhold the water for baptizing these people who have received the Holy Spirit just as we have? Peter, in essence, asks, "Who are we to withhold the waters of baptism for these people? Who are we to deny this act of God?" So, Peter baptized them in the name of Jesus Christ.

The word translated as astounded in verse 45 literally means to throw out of position. The circumcised believers held the position that one had to be circumcised to be baptized and receive the Holy Spirit. They probably thought they would teach Cornelius and his household about Jesus. He would repent and accept Jesus as his

Lord and Savior. They would circumcise the males and baptize everyone in the household. Then, Cornelius and his household may receive the Holy Spirit. That is how they thought things would go, through the proper procedure.

However, God had a different idea. God gave the Holy Spirit to Cornelius and his household while Peter was still speaking. God threw the circumcised believers completely off their position. They thought God would act one way but God did something completely different.

Peter was astute enough to recognize that God was acting. God gave these Roman Gentiles the Holy Spirit, just as he and those with him had. Later, Peter was severely criticized when he reported to the believers in Jerusalem. Peter told them what happened. He ended the report by saying, "If then God gave them the same gift that he gave us when we believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could hinder God? (11:17)." Peter recognized that this was God's plan. God's grace and Holy Spirit would be given to all people, not just the Jews.

Throughout the Biblical narrative, we see God working in ways and using people that knock us off our position. God used a fugitive murderer to lead the people out of Egypt. God used a prostitute to hide the spies in Jericho. Two women, Deborah and Jael, defeated the Canaanites and killed Sisera. God used foreign rulers for his purpose. The Egyptian King welcomed Joseph's family, saving them from famine. The Persian King, Cyrus, allowed the return of the exiles to Jerusalem. God sent the Son to be crucified so the world might be saved. Now God was giving the Holy Spirit to an uncircumcised officer in the army that was occupying the Promised Land.

God works in ways that knock us off our position. God works in ways and uses people that do not fit our conception of God's chosen. Can we say who can or cannot receive God's grace? Who are we to say who God will or will not use for divine purposes?

I know many have strong opinions about the changes in the Book of Discipline passed at the General Conference. Some see it as positive, some negative. My friends, I am not God. I do not know who God will or will not use. Throughout the many years of this debate, the one question I had to ask was, "Who am I? Who am I to say who God will and will not use?" The answer to that is nobody. God is not going to ask me if I think someone can be used to spread the Gospel.

"Who are we?" is a question we must always ask ourselves. We cannot understand the ways God works. We do not know who God will use or how. We may be thrown off our position but let us be as astute as Peter who recognized, "Who am I to hinder God?"
