

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Spirit of Wind and Breath

May 19, 2024

Acts 2:1-21 & John 15:26-27, 16: 4b-15

Day of Pentecost

Pentecost was one of three Jewish pilgrimage festivals. It was a celebration of the completion of the wheat harvest held fifty days after Passover. Diaspora Jews worldwide would come to Jerusalem to worship and give offerings at the Temple.

For Christians, Pentecost is the day the disciples received the Holy Spirit. It is celebrated fifty days after Easter and ends the Easter Season. We focus on the Holy Spirit and its work.

Both the passages from John and Acts reveal the work of the Spirit. In John, Jesus tells the disciples they will receive the Paraclete, John's term for the Holy Spirit. This term has multiple meanings. We see many of these in Jesus' final discourse in John.

The Holy Spirit is the continuing presence of Jesus in the world. In Chapter 14, Jesus promised he would not leave the disciples orphaned. After Jesus ascended, he would send the Paraclete. Jesus would be with the disciples even after his ascension through the giving of the Holy Spirit. Jesus remains with us and in the world today via the Spirit.

In the creation story in Genesis 2, God breathes life into the adam. The Hebrew word *ruach* and the Greek word *pneuma* mean breath, wind, and spirit. Thus, the Spirit gives life. In John 3:5, Jesus speaks of being born of water and Spirit. The Spirit gives life in this world through the water of the womb. The Spirit gives new life through a restored relationship with God. The Spirit restores our relationship with God, giving us new life.

The Spirit will expose the world and the world's perception of sin, righteousness, and judgment. The world sees sin as do's and don'ts, but in John's theology, sin is not trusting Jesus completely. Righteousness is the restored relationship with God, not doing right as the world defines. The ruler of the world, Satan, has already been condemned by God. Therefore, judgment will be by God's grace, mercy, and love. Judgment will be based on our trust in Jesus and our relationship with God, not our actions.

The Spirit teaches. The Spirit helps us to mesh the teaching of Jesus with our experience. The Spirit interprets the word of God in our context. There is much more we know today about the world and our physical makeup that was unknown two thousand years ago. The Spirit helps to fuse our scientific knowledge with scripture and theology.

The Spirit guides us. The Spirit is that little impulse to call somebody. The Spirit places us in opportunities to demonstrate the teaching of Jesus. A couple of times, I have been behind someone in the grocery store who was a little short, and I had the money to cover their shortage. The Spirit guides us to the ways God wants us to serve.

The Spirit provides comfort. The Spirit reminds the disciples of the presence of Jesus. The Spirit lets us know the presence of Jesus and, I believe, our loved ones who have gone before us.

The Spirit empowers. Those disciples huddled in the upper room on that Pentecost could not go out and speak to the crowd. They did not speak their language, literally. The Spirit empowered them and enabled them to speak in the languages of the crowd. The Spirit also enabled the crowd to hear the disciple's message. The Spirit gave the disciples the tools and the courage they needed to witness to the crowd.

The Spirit gives us the ability and courage to testify to the working of God in our lives. The Spirit gives us the words to say and what to do to show God's love. The Spirit definitely gives me the words to preach each Sunday. The reality is that it is not us giving witness but the Spirit through us.

Though the Spirit does even more, I want to end this enumeration of what the Spirit does with the most crucial work of the Spirit. The Spirit comes when the disciples are gathered as a community. Jesus spent more of his ministry preparing the disciples to become a community than he did healing and preaching. The Spirit builds the community of disciples. The Spirit adds to the community; three thousand on that Pentecost. That Pentecost marks the birth of the Church.

The Spirit builds community. The Spirit brings people together as the Body of Christ. The Spirit smashes the barriers we create to categorize people. The Spirit shows us the truth that we are all children of God. We are all brothers and sisters. The Spirit gives us the power to love despite our differences of opinion. The Spirit gives us the ability to love God and all our neighbors completely.

The Spirit is using us to be witnesses to the power of God. The Spirit empowers us to transform the world. The Spirit is bringing the whole world into a single community, a single Kingdom, the Kingdom of God.

The Spirit comes to all of us. We may wonder how do we know. How do we receive the Holy Spirit? We tend to look to the Pentecost story. We think of rushing wind and tongues like fire. We think the Spirit comes in a dramatic, spectacular fashion. We are immediately transformed and given great power. Except that does not often happen.

The resurrected Jesus appears to the disciples in John, chapter 20. Verse 22 reads, "When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit." Jesus breathes the Spirit into the disciples. Jesus breathes out the Spirit, the disciples breathe in the Spirit.

The Spirit is given through the life-affirming act of breathing. We live as we breathe. The Spirit enters into us with every breath we take. We receive the Holy Spirit continually as we breathe. Throughout our lives, we are being baptized with the Holy Spirit. We are given the power to be witnesses to the Gospel of Jesus every day and in every place. We are given the power to be witnesses of God's love. We are given the power to love all people and break down barriers that separate us.

We may not have the ability with words but we have a much greater ability the Spirit gives every one of us. The Spirit gives love, God's love for us. As God loves us, we love all our neighbors. We bring others into God's community, the Church. With the Spirit of love, we transform the world and bring about God's kingdom on Earth.
