

Three Simple Rules

Last week the new appointments began in SC. In New York this week the pastors will make their way to their new churches. All the annual conferences are done, and it feels like the beginning of a New Year for United Methodists all over the country.

The ordination service is one of the highlights of Annual Conference. It's always exciting and joyful and a little intense watching the Bishop lay his hands on the tops of the ordinands' heads. I can still hear Bishop Park commanding us to "take thou authority".

"Do no harm. Do all the good you can, and stay in love with God", he admonished. Bishop Park was reciting John Wesley's three simple rules.

Do no harm. Do all the good you can. Stay in love with God. These rules are general, but they will help you live a life that's pleasing to God. They are a general way of steering you in the right direction, of helping a soul obey God's commandments, avoid sin, resist temptation and avoid returning evil for evil. When we honor God, we love God and when we love God, we want to please God.

So, first of all, we want to do no harm in the world. We want to embrace the Golden Rule and not take it for granted but truly do unto others as we'd have them do unto us. And there may be lots of ways for us to avoid doing harm.

Recently, when I was talking to an old friend on the phone, she corrected me when I called myself an idiot for forgetting something. I just said it casually, like we all do here or there..."whoops, I'm an idiot." And my friend said, "don't talk to my friend that way." And I was touched by it, but also learned something. We can quite easily do harm to ourselves without even realizing it. How to you talk to yourself? How do you treat yourself?

Do no harm. Sounds like an easy thing to remember. But it may at times be harder than we think. And it may be more complicated once we start following how our money is spent, and what we invest in individually and as a nation. What do we pay attention to? What do we avoid? Do no harm may be harder to live by than its simplicity suggests.

Doing good may be easier to handle. The Book of Discipline tells us that we are doing good by being in every kind merciful after their power, as they have opportunity, doing good of every possible sort, and as far as possible to all men: to their bodies, of the ability which God giveth, by giving food to the hungry, by clothing the naked, by visiting or helping them that are sick or in prison. ¹

After the old language becomes understandable, it bears quite a resemblance to the Gospel. Do no harm. Do all the good you can.

What good can you do today? What good can we do as a community? As people of faith? As a church? And it is true that when we work together we can do more good in the world, in our own community.

This morning, the lectionary gives us a lesson from Galatians. It's one of Paul's most cherished letters, and you can see easily from this morning's passage that this is a letter, a letter written to a specific community, a specific group of churches that Paul has founded and is nurturing, but they are also a community in crisis.

A group of Jewish-Christian missionaries have come into the predominately gentile community of Galatia and told them they have to be circumcised to follow Christ, and so an internal conflict over beliefs is brewing. The New Interpreter's Bible commentary tells us that Galatians *is the fountainhead for all subsequent Christian theological reflection about justification by faith, the cross, the power of the Spirit, and the meaning of Christian freedom.*²
And with that freedom comes responsibility.

We are to reprove one another, helping one another stay the course and keep on the straight and narrow. Our reading from Galatians this morning echoes the cry: My friends, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness.

Perhaps, there is a balance here between *casting the first stone* and *restoring one another with gentleness*. Both Galatians and the *Book of Discipline* make it plain: we are our brother's keepers. So, we do good when we help one another do the right thing.

And Galatians continues: do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. There's a double incentive for doing the right thing—we're going to reap what we sow.

Folks prescribing to Eastern theologies will relate to this expression. You reap what you sow because karma is a boomerang. When you store your treasures on earth and invest in the flesh, you reap corruption. But if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up.

And the Book of Discipline tells us that we are doing good: By running with patience the race which is set before {us} denying {ourselves} and taking up the cross daily... What does it mean to you to take up the Cross? What does a life of discipleship look like to you? Is your life a witness for Christ?

We want to please God because we love God, and when you love someone—you want to please him. Remember the Gospel scene when a lawyer in the crowd confronts Jesus?

Reading from Matthew's Gospel, (Matt. 22: 34-40): Hearing that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, the Pharisees got together. One of them, an expert in the law, tested him with this question:

"Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself. All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments."

We do good when we love God with all our hearts and minds and souls and when we love our neighbors as ourselves. It sounds pretty simple: Love God and love one another. Indeed, we are a faith community because we are people who are in relationship with God and one another. It sounds simple, but it is often difficult for us to do. Sometimes it's hard to know if your behavior is harmful. Often it feels exhausting to do all the good you can. And so we pray, and we confess and we try again tomorrow. We learn and we help one another and we pray some more.

As we gather together today and celebrate the gift of Holy Communion, God's promise to us, our covenant with God, and the gift of God's grace, as we come together before God and ask for healing, healing for ourselves, healing for one another and our world, let's pray for love. Let's remember that we gather because of love. Because of love, we have been given the gift of new life, and the promise of abundant and eternal life. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son...

And when we love God with all our hearts and souls and minds, when we love one another, we avoid harm; we do all the good we can and we stay in love with God. Amen.

Let us pray:

God of love and mercy,

We all stand in need of your grace and forgiveness. Help us to know ourselves that we might truly confess our sins, forgive ourselves and one another and find new life through Jesus Christ. Amen.
