Lighting of the Advent Wreath

Advent Homily

William Blake said: *It is easier to forgive an enemy than to forgive a friend.* Blake's simple statement merits some thought. Think about your own relationships. We're invested in our friends and our families, and so it makes sense that they have the most emotional power over us.

We trust our friends. We count on them for understanding and support. And they know things about us—so it can be an awful blow to feel hurt or betrayed by a friend.

Of course, friendships come and go throughout our lives—but we don't choose our relatives; we're stuck with them. And if you're like most folks, nobody can make you as crazy as your family.

When you stop and think about it—we human beings engage in a lot of fussing and fighting. As individuals and as groups of individuals, united in a myriad of ways great and small, we struggle to get along, to share space and to share power, to balance our own needs and wants with the needs and wants of others.

We've been at war with one another since time began. Some of us sitting here this morning have little wars going on now and skirmishes planned for later.

We're very capable of hurting one another. We can be cruel and petty and resentful. We can hold on to old hurts and let them fester until they poison us. We can let our egos get the best of us, and dig our heels into stubbornness and pride. We gossip and say things, unkind and untrue, about one another all the time.

And forgiveness is hard from every angle—whether we need to seek it for ourselves or give it to others, forgiveness challenges us throughout our lives. We can hold grudges forever, and we can have a hard time forgiving ourselves. We human beings can sure be a mess.

The good news is—this is Advent. And we hear John the Baptist calling from the wilderness: “Repent. Go and prepare the way of the Lord”.

And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people by the forgiveness of their sins.

By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.

The dawn from on high will break upon us. Emmanuel, God is with us. Through God's grace and

love and forgiveness we can be guided into the way of peace. With God's grace we can love one another and forgive one another. Inside and out—we can walk in the ways of peace because Christ has rescued us. God has looked *favorably on his people and redeemed them*. So that we *might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all our days*.

This is Advent, and we can hear John the Baptist calling from the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord.

This is December, and we are busy with preparations. We are planning the holidays. We're preparing for guests. We're preparing meals and baking cookies and shopping, and worrying about money.

Do we make room for God? Do we make room for God in our day to day lives—everyday? Do we prepare our souls and our hearts and our minds as well as we prepare for the gifts under the Christmas tree?

Do we make room for God in our relationships, in our joy and connection and intimacy and in our jealousy and wounded-ness and rage? How do we prepare the way of the Lord and see clearly when the dawn on high breaks upon us?

“Repent!” John the Baptist cries out from the wilderness. And perhaps, we'd do well to take his advice, no matter how corny and simple it sounds. Advent is the time to examine your life and say, “Lord, here are the spots where I need help and healing and forgiveness. These are the places that I've fallen short. Here, Lord, are my sins.”

Plato will tell us that the *unexamined life is not worth living*. And Advent is a time for us to examine our lives closely, to confess the sin and the shortcomings and the fear and to ask God for the healing and the guidance and the grace that puts us on a path to peace, the comforting, confidant peace that only God can give, the kind of peace that can change your life and change the world.

Whatever lays heavy on your heart this Advent season, whatever you need to shine a light on and own—give it to God. Whatever hurt and anger and anxiety you're carrying around, lay it down this Advent season, lay it down at God's feet. Tell God what's on your mind.

Prepare first with a sincere desire to feel God's presence in your life. Trust in God's grace and surrender to God all that you are. Ask God to guide you into the way of peace.

This is Advent, and we've been promised redemption. The One who will heal us from the inside out is coming! Prepare the way.

By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from on high will break upon us, to give light to those who

sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace.

Will you pray with me?

God of Grace,

Give us the courage to love and the strength to forgive.
