The Power of Encouragement – It's more than just mere words!!!!

Many a man and woman who quit would have kept going if they had just received a word of encouragement from someone. Encouragement is so vital that the scriptures rank it up there with gifts like teaching and leadership (see Romans 12:6-8). Here are just two stories that illustrate the power of encouragement.

The first story is about two men who are sharing a hospital room. There was only one window in the room much closer to one man's bed than the other. So one man could see out the window and the other who could not get up yet from his bed could not see out the window. Every time, when the first man was sitting by the window, he described in great detail all he saw outside the window to his roommate who couldn't see these things. The man who was bed ridden so looked forward to these descriptions of the outside world from day to day. Descriptions of cars going by and people walking and dogs and cats and the cloud patterns and other wonders were described every day. When the bed ridden man heard all this he would close his eyes and imagine all these scenes he could not see. Then tragically the patient who described the outside world so well died in his sleep one night. Of course the bed ridden man was very sad about this. After some time, the bed ridden man asked the nurses if he could be switched to the other bed. He hoped that as he got better he too could look out the window at the wonders that had been described to him. He was moved and as soon as the patient could muster the strength he propped himself up on one elbow and took his first look out the window and to his shock there was nothing outside that window but another brick wall. When a nurse came into the room later, the patient related this story and asked why his roommate would make up such stories. The nurse replied "because, you were not supposed to live and neither were you supposed to ever get out of that bed and he overheard conversations about your health and so attempting to help you he made those stories up to encourage you to get better. It worked!"

The second story is about baseball great Jackie Robinson. One day playing at home in Brooklyn he wasn't so great. Jackie committed a throwing error late in a game that cost the Dodgers two unearned runs. The hometown crowd booed and hissed Jackie for his error and his skin color. Robinson was legitimately concerned for his very safety after such a mistake. The fans booed all the louder and began to throw trash onto the playing field when "Pee Wee" Reese, the Dodgers great shortstop, walked over to Jackie and put his arm around him and stood there with him until the crowd grew quiet.

Throughout Robinson's life he would refer to this story and tell everyone how much it meant to him what "Pee Wee" Reese had done for him that day on the baseball diamond. Jackie would say, "Reese's encouragement to me possibly saved my career". Of course some of us will excuse this as not being that important. But how do you know what it meant to Jackie Robinson?

The smallest word of encouragement can mean the world to someone when life is difficult. Don't ever discount it! As Christians, we have the very power of life words living in us through our faith in JESUS. Share those words when possible to others and watch the encouragement grow! It's contagious! I trust that all of our church family will have a blessed summer season!

What the Nurture Team and Its Members Do

Hi! I'm Marilyn Lloyd. Many of you know me as President of the United Methodist Women. Today, however, I'm here to tell you about another responsibility that I have in service to Trinity. I am also the Chair of the Nurture Team, one of the groups that meets with Church Council. I think Nurture is most exciting, because it has each of you in mind. Many activities happening in the church are planned within the Nurture meetings. We discuss if and how they can be done again, or if an activity has outworn its welcome. If not, we plan toward making repeated activities more memorable, or if a new event could be held so that Trinity is more vital and exciting. We coordinate with the other activities happening at Trinity, by putting the dates on the calendar and then working with those responsible for events, <u>KEEPING IN MIND our vision so that we Connect</u>, <u>Nurture, Inspire, and Transform</u>.

The Nurture team meets bi-monthly just before Council on the third Sunday of the month. As I tell you about the members of our Nurture Team, please think about how you would fit in as a team member or as a participant in the activities described.

Members include the **Pastor**, Robert Reeves, who attends to be aware of the happenings of Trinity and to provide expertise and give input as needed, about how we fit into the wider United Methodist Church's goals.

As **Chairperson**, Marilyn Lloyd gives overall supervision and keeps team members activities coordinated with one another. These members include:

Worship Chairperson: Tom Geddens provides information on the needs for weekly vital, inspirational worship, and coordinates seasonal church events with other activities being planned.

Director of Music: Jackie McNeill provides insight into the inspirational message provided by the choir and the planning being done to achieve that goal.

Pacers: Jewel Pearcy and her team call members asking for prayers or give information about members having special needs.

Hospital Ministry: Coordinated by Bonnie Ramsey and Jo Ann Heiting, this is a new ministry whose purpose is to aid in the healing and wellness of our congregation as members find themselves in the hospital and facing (always) a new experience. Led by God, they provide love and assurance in a time of uncertainty.

Hospitality: As co-leader, I, along with Genie Duncan, work to coordinate special events and receptions sponsored by Trinity, coordinate the Wonderful Wednesday meals and when a death occurs, provide meals and comfort to the bereaved.

Youth Coordinator: Ruth Frady has the exciting task of providing a way for youth to attend special events and to mentor the Youth as they grow in their faith.

Children's Coordinator: Patsy Boggs and Tom Geddens are a team that lead the children in Sunday School and are responsible for the children's activities. They are always thankful for your help and concern.

Senior Adult Coordinator: Becky Derrick plans visits to the homebound with gift baskets. Some visits include caroling at various times in the year. She also plans trips for our Trinity Travelers, or Mature Methodists, from time to time.

Presidents or a designated person from the official Church organizations of **United Methodist Women**, **United Methodist Men** and the **United Methodist Youth** are invited to share their needs and plans in order to coordinate with Trinity's mission.

As this is a recruiting informational moment, there are some openings in the Nurture team that you may like to consider. Right now, there are openings for persons interested in being the **Coordinator of the Young Adults** activities and someone to lead us in **the Stewardship Campaign**.

Young Adult Coordinator: Coordinates activities for persons 18 - 35. It may include planning times where group activities may happen in homes, at restaurants or at football games, etc. so that a time is made to put Jesus into busy lives.

Stewardship Chairperson: Stewardship is remembering the promises each one of us made when joining the church to give our gifts of money, time and talents. This means taking from the top or best, the first of our money and giving the first and best of our gifts. One or more of you may consider being Stewardship Chair as a way to use your talents for God's purpose. The Stewardship Chairperson plans and coordinates the stewardship campaign that is held from about September to November, culminating in our potluck church dinner on Consecration Sunday. That's when we Trinity members of all ages thoughtfully make our monetary pledges to Trinity for the next year.

As you can see, our Nurture team members are to meet the needs of the various ages and groups within the church. We need ideas and new enthusiasm and participation. We need both thinkers and doers. If you can't do both, let us know what you are able to do. You are invited to join a team. You can contact me or one of these team leaders, or tell Pastor Robert, as Chair of the Lay Leadership, how you would like to help so that we each bring our best to Trinity.
