John's Jottings

"Let us go across to the other side." (Mark 4: 35)

These words begin Mark's account of Jesus stilling the storm at sea. Luke's account of this miracle follows Mark's almost verbatim except Luke adds "of the lake." Upon reaching the other side, Jesus heals the Gerasene demoniac, possessed by a legion of demons. Jesus knew that there were those that needed healing on the other side of the lake, even though that was gentile territory. To meet that need, Jesus and the disciples had to go across the lake in a boat.

Jesus and the disciples hop in the boat and cast off to sail to the other side of the lake. Jesus quickly falls asleep in the boat as they head to the other side.

Suddenly a storm arises! Waves crashing over the sides of the boat! Thunder clapping! Lighting Flashing! Rain pouring down! The disciples panic! Jesus sleeps. The disciples wake Jesus up, "Don't you care that we are going to die!" Jesus calms the storm and admonishes the disciples for their lack of faith.

We tend to look at the lack of faith of the disciples as their not trusting that with Jesus they would be safe during the storm. But if we look at this beginning line, "Let us go across to the other side" we can see that their lack of faith may not be that Jesus would keep them safe in the storm, but that Jesus would get them to the other side.

Sometimes Jesus tells us to go the other side. The other side may be many things. For some it may be the other side of grief, the new normal without the loved one. It may be the other side of school so one may begin that career dream. It may be the other side of retirement. It may be the other side of a career change. It may be the other side of a new mission for the church as the neighborhood changes. In our present circumstances it is the other side of this pandemic which has upset much in our lives.

Jesus did not tell the disciples that it would be smooth sailing across the lake to the other side. Jesus did not say that there would not be storms. But he did say that they would go across to the other side. With Jesus in the boat they were able to get through the storm to the other side.

When Jesus tells us to go to the other side, he does not promise that there will not be any storms. Getting to the other side of grief may mean many agonizingly lonely nights. Getting to the other side of school may be filled with nightmares of difficult classes or teachers. Getting to the other side of retirement or a career change may lead to a crisis of identity as we often identify ourselves by our career. Getting to the other side of a new mission for the church may be fraught with uncertainty and conflict. And it may seem that we will never get to the other side of this pandemic.

When Jesus tells us to go across to the other side we will get across. There may be storms. There may be conflicts. There may be uncertainties. There may be nightmares. There may be loneliness. There may be many obstacles in getting to the other side. But we can have faith that Jesus will get us through the storms and all the other obstacles we may face as we go across the lake to the other side.
