On December 22, I participated in a teleconference through DEHEC with Dr. Linda Bell. Dr. Bell stated that with the safe and effective vaccines coming out we are seeing the light at the end of this COVID-19 pandemic. South Carolina received its first doses of the vaccine that week. These first doses are going to frontline healthcare workers caring for the critically ill, those most likely to be exposed to the virus. Those next in line would be staff and residents of nursing homes, assisted living and other congregate living facilities. Then it would go to essential workers and those in vulnerable populations. Finally, it would go to the generally healthy public.

That said, it will be several months before most of us will be able to be vaccinated. During this time, we need to continue our present precautions of avoiding crowds, wearing masks and maintain social distancing. Even after one is vaccinated, they need to continue precautions until 60-70% of the population is vaccinated.

The vaccine will not be available to children under the age of 16, or pregnant women because there have not been enough trial subjects to determine the possible risks to these populations.

Common side effects have been pain and swelling at the injection site, slight fever and some ache and pain which usually resolve with 48 hours. Side effects do appear less in older people.

We thank God for the scientists, doctors and technicians who developed this vaccine. We thank God for all the people worldwide who participated in the trials. We thank God that with this vaccine, we may see the end of this pandemic in the near future. But until that time let us continue to be vigilant in our precautions even after we are vaccinated until it is safe to stop precautions.
