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## John's Jottings

An incident came to mind recently that occurred while I was a graduate student at the USC School of Social Work. In a course on race and gender we were discussing stereotypes, that is, placing a broad characteristic on a group of people based on a frequently erroneous perception of the group. The instructor made the statement that white southern males were the hardest people to change. The instructor saw me as I was shaking my head no and immediately said "John, you don't count. You're a social worker."

First, I disagreed with her stereotype about white southern males. I don't think that white southern males are any harder to change that anybody else. Her second comment about me not counting because I was a social worker seemed to say that since I was a social worker, I could not be a "real" white southern male. For the record I was born and raised on a peanut farm in South Georgia so you could not get more southern than that.

The instructor's comments hurt in that they challenged my identity. I am a white southern male and I am (or was at the time) a social worker. In her eyes I could not be both. I could not be a white southern male (who are conservative and difficult to change) and be a social worker (who we all know are bleeding heart liberals). Her perceptions and stereotypes discredited me as the person I was.

That is the problem with stereotypes of all sorts, even those that we may think are positive. Stereotypes discredit the person as who they are. Instead of seeing them as God created them, we see them as how we think they should be. God created each person as a unique individual not with some standard cookie cutter.

We are each formed by our own DNA, and experiences that are unique to us. To stereotype is to deny each person's uniqueness. It denies the true individual character of each person as God made them. It denies God's intent for us to see each person in the way in which they were uniquely made.

That instructor's stereotype of me hurt me deeply. It denied who I was in her sight. She did not see me as who I was but as she thought I should be. That is how any stereotype of any group is harmful. Stereotypes are harmful to others for we tend to react to others according to our stereotype rather than seeing them as the individual that God made.

May we avoid making stereotypes and look beyond our stereotypes of people so we may see them as the unique person that God made.

There is light at the end of the tunnel. After the Sunday morning service, we have been polling the congregation on how many in attendance are fully protected: two shots of Phizer or Moderna more than two weeks prior, one shot of Johnsons and Johnson two weeks prior. two shots or one Johnson and Johnson but within two weeks, how many have had only one shot and are waiting the second and finally, how many have not gotten vaccinated yet.

As of Sunday, On Sunday, April 18, 70% of the congregation in attendance were fully protected and 17% were on their way to being fully protected (I am now in the fully protected category). Therefore, it is now safe to gather in small groups of fully protected people.

The Church Council voted for each Sunday School Class to meet again as the members of the class feel comfortable and become fully protected. Other activities, such as Time Together and Snacks and a Movie, will also restart. Time together will restart on the first Sunday in May as well as movies on May 30. The CDC continues to recommend social distancing and face coverings which will continue to be required for worship until further notice. Since it is now safe to gather in small groups and small groups are good places to invite people into our community at Trinity, we would like to see more small groups developing. These may be Bible Studies, Discipleship Groups, interest groups (art lessons, book clubs, prayer groups, cooking classes) or any others that may help us to make Disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world. If you have any ideas or ever wondered if we could do something at Trinity, bring it to the attention of the Church Council. Attend the next Church Council meeting on June 14 at 6:00 p.m. and share your ideas of any small groups we can start.
