John's Jottings Where Does Our Money Go?

Where does our money go? All that money we send to the General Church in our apportionments, where does it go? What does it fund? I don't want our money from Trinity to fund something to which we may not agree. These are legitimate questions. We may hear rumors of the church financing Black Lives Matter, or Wesley Covenant Association, or Planned Parenthood. I recently ran across an article from the UM newsletter that I receive daily which addressed these concerns.

There are seven line items in our apportionments that go to the General Church. These are Africa University, the Black College Fund, the Episcopal Fund, the General Administration Fund, Interdenominational Cooperation Fund, Ministerial Education, and World Services. Some of these are specific. Africa University goes to support Africa University, the first Pan-African University on the continent. The Black College Fund supports 11 United Methodist-affiliated HBCUs. The Episcopal Fund supports active and retired bishops worldwide. The Ministerial Education Fund supports our affiliated seminaries and clergy education. The Interdenominational Cooperation Fund supports the work of the National Council of Churches and the World Council of Churches.

The following agencies of the United Methodist Church are primarily funded through either the General Administration or World Service Fund: The Commission on Archives and History, Church and Society, UM Communications, Discipleship Ministries, Finance and Administration, Global Ministries, Higher Education and Ministry, Religion and Race, and the Status and Role of Women. Our money does go to support these ministries of the church.

Some UM agencies are partially funded by the General Administration or World Service. The United Methodist Women and Men receive some support but are primarily supported by members. Global Ministries and United Methodist Committee on Relief receive support from World Service but also from additional calls for response to need. UMCOR cannot predict the number of disasters it may respond to, so it is difficult to budget beyond the administrative budget.

The United Methodist Publishing House and Upper Room are primarily funded through subscriptions and sales so our apportionments do not support these entities. Retirement and Health benefits are paid primarily by the participants but there are some subsidies for clergy in poorer regions of the world.

There are many United Methodist ministries such as children's homes and hospitals that are ministries of a particular Annual Conference, such as Epworth Children's Home. These are funded through the Annual Conference, not the General Conference. The United Methodist Church does not fund any groups within the denomination that advocate a particular social or political stance such as Reconciling Ministries, Wesley Covenant Association Good News, Institute on Religion and Democracy, and Methodist Federation for Social Justice. All of these are funded by its membership and private donations. The UMC does not fund any of the following organizations: Black Lives Matter, March of Dimes, World Vision, Samaritans Purse, Planned Parenthood, or any political party or candidate. As of 2017 the UMC no longer funds the Religious Colation for Reproductive Health. An individual congregation may support some of these entities, but The United Methodist Church as a denomination does not. Therefore none of Trinity's money goes to these entities.

Over the next few months, I will give a brief overview of each of the different agencies of the church so you may be informed of how our money that goes to the General Church is being used to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world.
