"We don't have a menu."

puzzled, "How does this place work?"

It may be one thing that the preacher said in a sermon. It may be some ministry with which they disagree. It may be they did not like who was selected for a leadership position. Or it may be a position the denomination takes on an issue that has nothing to do with their local congregation. Some on both sides have left or are considering leaving the United Methodist Church over the homosexuality issue.

When we leave the Church over one issue that we may not like, we reject all the good, the things we do like. The Church is not a perfect organization that can please all the people all the time. The only way that could happen was if we were all alike. Fortunately, God did not make us that way. God created us all with different perspectives, likes, and dislikes. One should think of all the good they receive from the Church before considering leaving over one issue they do not like.

We are all hungry for God's grace. We are all hungry to be part of the Body of Christ, the Church. We all know that we need the Church to be nourished and grow to continue the journey of faith. God gives grace on a full platter, and sometimes there may be rutabagas on the plate. We may choose to deal with what we do not like and receive all the good things that come from being in the Church to be filled with God's goodness, or we may push the plate away because of the rutabagas, that which we do not like, and go away empty, missing all the goodness that is in the Church.
