December  $1^{st}$ ,  $8^{th}$ ,  $15^{th}$ , and  $22^{nd}$  12 p.m.

The Gospel of Matthew begins with an unusual genealogy of Jesus. What makes this genealogy remarkable is that it includes five women. Biblical genealogies did not usually include women. One of the women is Mary, the mother of Jesus, so it is not too surprising that she is included. However, the other four are startling. These women are Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, and Bathsheba.

During the four Wednesdays in December (the 1<sup>st</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 15<sup>th</sup>, and 22<sup>nd</sup>), we will study the stories of each of these women as our Advent Bible Study. The story of Tamar is in Genesis 38. The story of Rahab is in Joshua 2 and 6:22-25. Ruth, of course, has her own book. We initially find Bathsheba in 2 Samuel 11-12:25, and she plays a significant role in the succession of Solomon after David's death (1Kings 1). As we study the stories of these women, we want to ask the following questions. What are the common threads of each of these women? What is the importance of each one's story? What is the message from their inclusion in the genealogy of Jesus?

The study will be held at noon on Wednesdays in December in the sanctuary and will also be live-streamed. We will begin with the story of Tamar, so please read in advance and email me with any questions or observations you may have. I look forward to seeing you as we study these remarkable women.

Of all the decorations we put up at Christmas, the one I enjoy the most is the manger scene. We probably all have at least one, which we usually display in a prominent place in the house. Some may be simple with just a few pieces. Others may be elaborate with many characters. Be it simple or elaborate, most manger scenes have some primary characters. Each of these primary characters has a meaning and message for us at Christmas.

Of course, the primary character is the baby, Jesus. Jesus is the Son of God. Jesus is God incarnate. This baby wrapped in swaddling clothes is God, who comes to us. God, the creator of all things, comes into the world as a helpless baby, born in a feed trough. Think about it. God could have come into the world at any place or time but chose to enter as a baby in a feed trough.

The following main characters are the earthly parents of this baby, Mary and Joseph. Joseph was a carpenter in a small village in a backwater province far from the seat of power. Mary was a young woman from a peasant family with no connections from the same town. They were an ordinary peasant couple, with no links to power except having King David as a distant ancestor. Think about it. Instead of having Jesus born to a king and queen, God chose a peasant couple who lived far from the seat of power.

Many manger scenes have both shepherds and Magi, while some have one or the other. We find the shepherds in Luke's Gospel. The angels appear to the shepherds in the field and tell them the good news. So the shepherds go to Bethlehem and find the baby as the angels said. Shepherds were the lowest in terms of occupational status. They were usually older men and young boys who could do no other work. Think about it. The first to receive the Good News of the birth of Jesus were those of the lowest status.

We find the Magi in the Gospel of Matthew. The three wise men came from the east, probably Persia, following the star that rose upon the birth of the prophesied king. They came bearing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. They were looking for a sign and followed the star, which was the sign. Think about it. It was foreigners who saw and responded to the sign God placed in the heavens.

Since the scene takes place in a stable, we put animals in our manger scene. We have sheep since we have shepherds. There may be donkeys and cattle. Some may have a camel that the Magi rode on. Some of the more elaborate manger scenes may have many other animals. Think about it. Jesus was not born just for humans but for all creatures.

While some other manger scenes may have many more characters, these are the primary ones. Even in the most elaborate manger scenes, you will not find some characters. You will not find Herod, the king of the Jews, nor will you find any High Priests from the temple. Think about it. The political and religious leaders did not come to the manger.

As you set up your manger scene, think of each of the characters as ones that responded to the good news that God has come into the world. Consider who is not in the scene. The ones that come are those that respond to the revelation of God coming into the world. Those not in the scene are those who reject the God who comes into the world. May we always be in the scene, responding to the God who comes into the world.
