Many of us go to church as a regular part of our lives. The church is important to us. We have trouble understanding people who do not go to church. Sometimes we don't know what to say to convince those who do not go to church. In this writing, I want to examine some common reasons people have for not going to church, then some ways to respond.

One reason people have for not going to church is that they have been harmed by the church or a clergyperson. We see this with people who are "different". Rather than being welcomed into the church, they are told overtly or covertly that they are not welcome. One couple left one of my previous churches because she never felt fully welcomed. The final straw was when she asked how she could help in the kitchen, and the person in charge told her to get out of the kitchen. Often people who are divorced, have had an abortion, or have been to jail feel that the church has rejected them. To people who have been harmed in some way by the church, the best response is to listen to their story. Try to understand by putting yourself in their shoes. Validate their feelings. Let them know their feelings are understandable and OK. Then just let them know that they are loved.

Another common reason that people don't go to church is that they feel the church is a bunch of hypocrites. This is sadly a common reason among young people. They see people espousing one thing in church, but then doing the complete opposite outside of the church. They see people saying "love neighbor" and then posting hateful messages on social media. First, we need to make sure that the life we live outside the church is aligned with what we say inside the church. Then, we admit that yes, the church is full of people that say one thing in church and then say and act differently outside the church. Remind them that the church is not made up of saints but sinners striving to become saints. We are not perfect but we are going on to perfection.

Some say they can find God anywhere. They experience God in nature while hunting, fishing, or on the golf course. While one may experience God in these places, they are missing something. They are missing the community. They are missing having people to support and guide them in drawing closer to God. The writer of Hebrews says that we come together to encourage one another and provoke one another to love and do good deeds (10: 24-25). In reality, the best response to someone who does not go to church is to tell them why you go to church. Validate whatever reason they may have, saying something like, "there are hypocrites in church but I go to learn how to walk more closely with God." Responding like this tends to make the other person less defensive and maybe more amenable. Another thing is to rethink the church as more than the 11:00 worship hour. The church is whenever people gather to increase their knowledge of God and their love for God and neighbor. For some, a small group like a class meeting or Bible Study may be easier than a worship service as a beginning. So, invite them to one of these or some other activity. During the time of quarantine, many just simply got out of the habit. In that case, remind them that they are missing the personal relationships even if they have been participating online. Maybe volunteer to give them a wake-up reminder call on Sunday Morning.

As going to church is becoming less a cultural norm, we need to be more active and intentional in sharing what the church means to us. Let people know why you come to church and what they are missing. Let them know of alternatives such as small groups if the are uncomfortable in a church service. Remember church is whenever and wherever people gather to worship and grow in their faith. Shalom,
